## What's the Buzz? Beekeeping information and resources

The season for local honey is right around the corner! Each year Anson Extension helps connect buyers and sellers of local honey. Have you ever wondered if beekeeping was something you could enjoy to extract your own honey, or simply enjoy as an activity? Would you like to learn more about hobby beekeeping in Anson Co. and the Carolinas? Here are four sources of research-based information to help you learn more about this exciting hobby; from local chapters to online beginner apiculture classes.

The Anson County Beekeepers Association meets monthly, January through October, at Welika Fish House Restaurant at 7 p.m. on the 4th Thursday of each month. Visitors are welcome. A 1 to 2 hour beekeeping presentation follows their



regular business meeting. This is a great place for continuing education, to meet local beekeepers, and learn honeybee biology, seasonal hive maintenance, problemsolving, and get an idea of the time and money commitment beekeeping requires. Another resource for

cation and Engagement System (BEES). It's available to the public for a minimal fee and taught by NC State Professor and Extension Apiculture Specialist, Dr. David Tarpy.

"Anson Crisis Ministry brought home 2,655 lbs. of undistributed food," added Barnes. "Thank you! A great deal of food was distributed!"


