April Unemployment Rate Lowest in a Long Time

Anson County's unemployment rate for April was 10.2%. That number is still too high, but is the lowest than the unemployment rate has been in several years. In March the rate was 10.9%. The state of North Carolina's unemployment rate for April was 8.5%, down from March's 8.9%

In April 2012 Anson County's unemployment rate was 10.5%.

Anson's total labor force in April was 10,884. Of that number 9,774 were employed and 1,110 were unemployed. In March the total labor force was 10,910, with 9,723 employed and 1,187 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 97 of North Carolina's counties in April, increased in two and remained the same in one. All 14 of the State's metro areas experienced rate decreases.

Graham County had the highest unemployment rate at 15.9 percent while Orange County had the lowest at 5.3 percent. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 12.3 percent experienced the highest rate and Durham-Chapel Hill at 6.3 percent had the lowest. The April not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 8.5 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates fell in 76 counties, increased in 19 and remained unchanged in five. Twelve metro areas experienced rate decreases, while two experienced rate increases.

Statewide the number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in April by 17,251 to 4,291,469, while those unemployed fell 19,921 to 398,043. Since April 2012, the number of workers employed statewide increased 26,567, while those unemployed decreased 20,171.

Wadesboro Drinking Water Quality Report: No Violations

The Town of Wadesboro released its Annual Drinking Water Quality Report which shows the water system did not have a single violation for 2012. This report is designed to keep customers aware of drinking water quality including details about water sources, containments, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies.

Denise Cannon Earns \$10,000 Grant for Sheriff's Office

Anson County Sheriff Tommy Allen announced that his department has been notified by the Governor's Crime Commission that they will be awarded a \$10,000 grant for dealing with gangs in Anson County. The grant required no local matching monies. Sheriff Allen said that the funds will be used to purchase various equipment and supplies regarding gang activities and investigations.

Since 2005 the Sheriff's Office has received \$1,425,955 in various grants from state and tederal programs that have gone to pay for equipment, radios, vehicles, salaries and training. "These are local tax dollars we didn't have to spend. We've worked hard to get these grants over the years. It's very competitive," Sheriff Allen said. "My office assistant Denise Cannon has had to work very hard and extra hours to successfully apply and win these grants over these years. I want to publically say how much I appreciate her enthusiasm, dedication and extra hard work.' The Sheriff said that he would expect the money to come to the county sometime after October 1st, when state and federal budgets are all in place.



Logan Goodwin Donates Stuffed Animals for Seventh Year

For the previous six years Logan Goodwin and his grandmother Diane Goodwin have given the Anson County Sheriff's Office a new supply of stuffed animal and figures to be given out to children in crisis situations. This year Logan had his fifth grade class at Wadesboro Elementary School help and it became a class project that resulted in dozens of new stuffed animals and figures collected. They were given to the Sheriff's Office on Wednesday, June 5th.

The Sheriff's Office uses them and distributes them to other law enforcement agencies, DSS and Domestic Violence Coalition. These agencies along with the Sheriff's Office give them out to children at accident scenes, police calls, domestic violence situations or any situation where small children are frightened and need something to "hug" or hold on to.

Sheriff Tommy Allen said, "Sometimes children are in the middle of very harsh situations Life's not always fair and little children seem to be where it's the most unfair. I've seen these stuffed animals dry up tears and give a trembling child something secure to hold on to. I want to thank Logan, his grandmother Diane and the classmates from Logan's fifth grade class for continuing this project for the seventh year in a row."

Since this project was begun seven years ago by Logan, churches, civic organizations and many individuals now help keep a good supply on hand at the Sheriff's Office.

Logan is the son of Bruce and Kitt Goodwin, and the grandson of Diane and Billy Goodwin of Wadesboro.

Anson Farm Service Agency County **Committee Nomination Period Has Begun**

Area producers needed for important decisions

The nomination period for Anson Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees began on Monday, June 17. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said, "I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers to participate in this year's county committee elections by nominating candidates by the August 1 deadline. County committees are a vital link between the farm community and the U.S. Department of Agriculture and provide an opportunity to farmers and ranchers for their opinions and ideas to be heard. We have been seeing an increase in the number of nominations of women and minority candidates and I hope that trend continues.

To be eligible to serve on the FSA Anson County Committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area in which the person is a candidate. Anson County farmers and producers may nominate themselves or others, and organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form, FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available online at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms for the 2013 election must be postmarked or received in the Anson County USDA Service Center by close of business on August 1, 2013. Elections take place this fall. While FSA Anson County Committee does not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, it makes decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees. Committees consist of three to 11 members that are elected by eligible producers. FSA will mail ballots to eligible voters beginning November 4. The voted ballots are due back to the local county office either via mail or in person by December 2. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office on January 1, 2014. Thoughts about Blood Donation on World Sickle Cell Day - June 19

The Community Blood Center of the Carolinas (CBCC) is commemorating World Sickle Cell Day on Wednesday, June 19 by helping raise awareness about the role donors play in the treatment of sickle cell. "While experienced around the globe, World Sickle Cell Day is also experienced by patients in our own community," said Martin Grable, president and CEO of Community Blood Center of the Carolinas. "We are working with our local hospitals, patients and donor community to 'reshape' understanding about sickle cell and bring attention to the ongoing need our local sickle cell patients have for blood products. Their lives depend on blood donations.'

Research shows that sickle cell affects more than 80,000 people in the U.S., 98 percent of whom are African-American. According to studies, more than half of all persons with sickle cell will require a blood transfusion in their lifetime and the majority will require multiple transfusions, using an average of four units per month. "While not an African-American disease, sickle cell is most often experienced by African Americans in our community," Grable said. "Because of the need to be frequently transfused, the best matches for blood type come from African-American donors."
