WPD Hot Car Display Demonstrates the Danger of Leaving Children and Pets Unattended in Vehicles

Summer is here and with it comes the rising temperatures. Wadesboro Police Chief Thedis Spencer has a growing concern for both children and pets left unattended in vehicles during these times of high temperatures. Since 1990 almost 800 children have died in these preventable tragedies. An average of 37 children die needlessly every year from vehicular heatstroke. In 2016 a total of 39 children died. One of the biggest challenges; nobody thinks this could ever happen to them.



Safety steps include:

- Put something in the back seat so you have to open the back door when leaving the vehicle - cell phone, employee badge, handbag, left shoe, etc.
- Every time you park your vehicle open the back door to make sure no one has been left behind. "Look Before You Lock."
- Ask your childcare provider or babysitter to call you within 10 minutes if your child hasn't arrived on time.
- Keep a stuffed animal in your child's car seat and move it to the front seat to remind you when your baby is in the back seat.

Over the next week you may see a vehicle set up with a sign showing inside temperatures of the vehicle as compared to the temperature outside. Temperatures inside the vehicle can raise drastically compared to those outside and this sign will help to show just how quickly the difference can become deadly.

Wadesboro Police Department obtained the equipment from the Office of the State Fire Marshall in conjunction with the Governor's Highway Safety Program. Wadesboro Police Department is hoping to spread the word countywide and will be loaning the equipment out to other agencies within the county to help raise awareness and hopefully prevent these tragedies in our area.

Free Groceries Available to Eligible Families this Saturday

The Burnsville Recreation & Learning Center (BRLC) Emergency Food Pantry will distribute free food products this Saturday and next, June 24 and July 1 at 9 a.m. These foods are provided by the NC Department of Agriculture through the Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina. Families will be served until the food runs out - first come, first served. Also, due to changes with the schedule, neighbors will be served only once monthly with these items.

The US federal income guidelines will be a determining factor for each individual's eligibility and food items will only be available to Ansonians who qualify. Individuals who have not registered before nor received food from the BRLC Emergency Food Pantry must have financial documentation as proof of income to be served. A neighbor who does not have the necessary documentations will not be served. Families that receive food stamp assistance automatically qualify. Each family will only be provided these commodities this month. Parents are asked not to bring small children. Neighbors, please park in parking lot behind center.

BRLC distributes free groceries to eligible families on Wednesdays at 9 a.m. and at other times. You can contact them at 704-826-8182 for information. BRLC is located at 13349 Highway 742 North in Burnsville, across from the Fire Department.
