Wadesboro Coalition for Peace Kickoff

Next meeting is scheduled for July 2

This is a release from the Town of Wadesboro: Nearly 200 community members packed Smith's Funeral Home on June 18 for the launch of the Wadesboro Coalition for Peace, a united effort to confront the impact of gun violence in Wadesboro and across the county. Wadesboro Mayor Fred Davis opened the meeting with a message of welcome and urgency. Leon Gatewood, CEO of HOLLA! Community Development Corporation (CDC) moderated the gathering, which focused on healing, accountability and hope. Speakers shared powerful reflections, voicing both grief and frustration over the recent spike in gun-related tragedies, while also pledging to take bold, united action. At the meeting, Wanda Smith, the mother of 22-yearold Desmond Tra'Jon Pegues, bravely shared her heart-wrenching journey of loss as she spoke about the pain of losing her son to violence and the ongoing process of navigating life through unimaginable grief. "We cannot afford to be silent or divided when it comes to the safety of our children and our community," Davis said. "We are standing together to let people know Wadesboro refuses to accept violence as the norm.' The coalition is grounded in the belief that real change begins with unity as demonstrated by the following strong network of grassroots organizations partnering with the Town of Wadesboro: HOLLA! CDC; the New Rural Project; Black Voters Matter; D.E.N. (Developing, Educating, Nurturing); Brothers 4 Life; the Caraway Foundation; Behind These Prison Walls; and local pastors and community members. The energy in the room made one thing clear: This is iust the beginning. The next community meeting will be held Wednesday, July 2 at 6 p.m. at Smith's Funeral Home, 603 Salisbury Street, Wadesboro. All are encouraged to attend, get involved and be part of the solution.

Application period ends July 1, for ages 15-18

Water Safety Tips

Parents and caregivers are encouraged to think about the importance of water safety to protect their children during the summer. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), drowning is the number one cause of death for children 1-4 years old in the United States. Over 4,500 people died due to drowning each year from 2020–2022, 500 more per year compared to 2019.

For families going to the beach, remember to pay attention to the warning flags that indicate the possibility of rip currents.

"North Carolina's beaches, lakes and pools will be crowded as we head towards the Fourth of July holiday," said NC Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey. "Remember to pay attention to the warning flags at the beach that indicate the possibility of rip currents. A rip current's force is strong enough to pull even the strongest swimmer out to sea."

If caught in a rip current, stay calm, don't fight the current and escape the current by swimming in a direction parallel to the shoreline. If at any time you are unable to reach the shore, draw attention to yourself and call for help.

"Most people believe a drowning person involves flailing arms or frantic calls for help, but that is not the case," said Causey. "Drowning happens quietly when a helpless person is unable to take a breath."

Water Tips:

- Always watch children and never leave them unattended.
- Keep children away from pool drains, pipes and other openings.
- Always keep a charged phone nearby. Use self-closing and self-latching gates.
- Know how to perform CPR on children and adults.
- Understand the basics of lifesaving so you can assist in an emergency.
- Install a fence at least four feet high around the perimeter of a pool or spa.

• Ensure all pools and spas have compliant drain covers. Install an alarm on the door leading from the house to the pool.
