On Wednesday, June 18, 2025 the Polkton Police Department was assisted by other agencies and conducted a saturation patrol in the Town of Polkton. The Monroe Police Department, Anson County Sheriff's Office, Stanly County Sheriff's Office, Norwood Police, North Carolina Highway Patrol and others assisted us with this saturation. Officers conducted speed enforcement and issued citations for traffic violations. Those totals were 66 citations issued for violations.

During one of the traffic stops a quantity of pills and cash were located and seized. That was headed to someone in our town to be distributed. Total weight was 79.98 grams of Schedule 1 narcotics.

Jeremy Jamaine Harwell Charged with Insurance Fraud

North Carolina Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey announced the arrest of Jeremy Jamaine Harwell, 51, of 175 Davidson Drive, Wadesboro. Harwell is charged with one count of insurance fraud and one count of attempting to obtain property by false pretense. Both charges are felonies.

According to special agents with the NC Department of Insurance's Criminal Investigations Division, Harwell filed a false claim to Southern General Insurance Company, providing false statements and forged invoice documents in attempt to substantiate his claim. He collected \$400 from the company.

The incident occurred on September 23, 2024, according to the warrant. Harwell was arrested on June 20, held at Anson County Jail and released on a \$20,000 unsecured bond. He will appear in Anson County District Court on July 8. "Insurance fraud hits consumers in the wallet," Commissioner Causey said.

"Insurance fraud hits consumers in the wallet," Commissioner Causey said. "Approximately 20 cents of every insurance premium dollar goes to covering the cost of fraud. I'm fighting this by aggressively pursuing and prosecuting insurance fraud in North Carolina."

North Carolina's May Employment Figures Released

The state's seasonally adjusted May 2025 unemployment rate was 3.7 percent, unchanged from April's revised rate. The national rate was unchanged at 4.2 percent.

North Carolina's unemployment rate increased 0.1 of a percentage point from a year ago. The number of people employed decreased 5,637 over the month to 5,092,894 and decreased 4,394 over the year. The number of people unemployed increased 284 over the month to 196,576 and increased 6,683 over the year.

Seasonally adjusted Total Nonfarm employment, as gathered through the monthly establishment survey, increased 400 to 5,091,900 in May. Industries experiencing increases were Construction, 1,600; Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 1,300; Government, 300; Leisure & Hospitality Services, 100; and Private Education & Health Services, 100. Major industries experiencing decreases were Professional & Business Services, 2,200; Manufacturing, 400; Information, 200; Financial Activities, 100; and Other Services, 100. Mining & Logging employment remained unchanged.

Tips for Caring for Livestock in Extreme Heat

Last week brought the hottest temperatures of the summer so far to our area. It is very important we manage our livestock during such temperature extremes to avoid heat stress. Check out the tips below to help keep your livestock safe this summer.

Provide access to clean water at all times. Animals will drink more water under extreme heat conditions, so make sure you are taking that into account. If you have automatic waterers or float valves on tanks, check to make sure they are functioning properly. Also make sure there is easy access for all your animals. If you have a large herd, you may need to consider adding more troughs so that animals are not having to wait or fight for access to a water tank.

Provide shelter or shade. This can be from trees, lean-tos, a barn, or any other structure that provides shade from the sun. Animals can get sunburned like people can. Pink skin is at a higher risk of getting burned. Providing shade can help prevent sunburn. Sunscreen can be applied to pink markings on horses, but be careful to avoid the eyes.

Avoid any exercise or stress. If it all possible, do not work animals. The increased stress and activity can easily push animals into heat stress. If you do work your animals, try to use those cooler morning hours before the temperature starts to rise.

Don't keep animals confined together. Give animals space to spread out to increase air movement.

Avoid hauling animals when possible. Confining animals in a trailer, especially in large groups, can be deadly in high temperatures. Again, use cooler night and morning temperatures if animals absolutely must be transported.

Animals with black fur and hide are at higher risk of heat stress. Animals that are not acclimated to the heat, such as animals that have been transported in from a cooler climate, are also at increased risk.

Be sure to observe your animals frequently for signs of heat stress. Signs can vary depending on species, but look for increased pulse and respiration rates, panting, drooling, lethargy, and muscle weakness.

What to Do if My Animal is Showing Signs of Overheating? If your animals are showing signs of extreme heat stress or heat stroke, contact your vet immediately. Move animals to a cool shaded area with access to water. Overheated animals can be cooled off by hosing them down with cool water.
