Celebrate July 4th Statewide with History and Nature

Prepare to have a patriotic Fourth of July celebration through an encounter with history or an adventure with nature at N.C. Department of Natural and Cultural Resources (NCDCR) attractions this year.

Enjoy the spirit of revolution at a historic site, a quiet walk in nature at one of 39 state parks and recreation areas, or a walk on the wild side at the North Carolina Zoo. The State Capitol will host a naturalization ceremony for new citizens and a day of fun activities for all.

Many NCDCR destinations will provide free or modestly priced recreation for the family and across age groups. All state parks and recreation areas will be open regular hours July 4th. The North Carolina Zoo, BATTLESHIP North Carolina and N.C. Aquariums will be open also. Most historic sites will be closed July 4, but some offer programs during Fourth of July weekend.


