Mobile Food Pantry Provides Free Groceries August 6



Stony Gap Fish House

Many of you, I am sure, remember back in the 1960's when there was a Stony Gap Fish House. It was located just off Highway 52, south of Albemarle. Floyd Sells owned and operated the first restaurant in the curve, later building a new, larger facility "around the curve – on top of the hill."

Pictured above are only two of many signs that I did for Floyd – these being 8 feet by 8 feet made it necessary for me to go up there to work. You will note the fish has a cigar (with smoke) in its mouth,

Many of you, I am sure, which was a custom of "Stud" (Floyd) ber back in the 1960's when - you rarely every saw him without was a Stony Gap Fish House. It his cigar, whether it was lit or not.

I had previously painted assorted messages across the entire front of his building, along with Charlie Brown, etc.

Floyd was quite a fellow – never meeting a stranger! After declining health, he closed the business – and is now deceased.
