Anson County's Unemployment Rate Remains a Low 4.3 Percent in May

Anson County's unemployment rate for May was 4.3%, very slightly higher than April's 4.1% rate. Statewide the unemployment rate was 3.7% in May, the same as in April. Anson's total labor force in May was 10,629. Of

that number 10,176 were employed and 453 were unemployed. In April the total labor force was 10,585 with 10,149 employed and 436 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 60 of North Carolina's counties in May, increased in eight, and remained unchanged in 32. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 7.5 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 2.8 percent.

Seven of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases, one increased, and seven remained unchanged. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 5.8 percent had the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 2.9 percent. The May not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 3.7 percent. When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 15 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in May by 37,232 to 4,835,398, while those unemployed decreased 1,008 to 184,582. Since May 2017, the number of workers employed statewide increased 108,389, while those unemployed decreased 28,554.


Stride for Pride Tennis Shoe Drive is Now Accepting Donations

Some of the companies soliciting funds have not been approved by my office nor any school based administrator.

This communication is to caution anyone who is approached by individuals, businesses or agencies soliciting funds for any ACS need; you should investigate this matter to make sure the donations are truly being solicited for the benefit of children enrolled in Anson County Schools. My office will now research any company, agency or individual who is soliciting funds. Kevin Gaskins, Kenny Brower and Chris Horne Win in NC DOT "Equipment Roadeo" Competition

The N.C. Department of Transportation held its annual "Equipment Roadeo" at Cabarrus Arena in Concord on May 23, giving Charlotte-area employees an opportunity to take part in a friendly competition of skill and accuracy. This event tests the safety awareness of employees in Anson, Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Stanly and Union counties.

Eighty-five operators were challenged to navigate heavy equipment through various obstacle courses to emphasize safety, precision and skill advancement. Of the winners, Kenny Brower won in his category for the second consecutive year.

The winners from each event will represent Division 10 at the State Roadeo in Raleigh on July 31. Winners from the statewide competition will move on to a regional contest with nine other Southeastern states in September.

Ansonville Bridge Scheduled for Replacement

The N.C. Department of Transportation has awarded a \$1.2 million contract to National Bridge Builders LLC of Kernersville to replace the bridge on Pinkston-River Road over Brown Creek, south of Ansonville. The bridge was closed last summer due to safety concerns. Built in 1959, the bridge is considered structurally deficient, which means speed or weight limits must be put on the bridge to ensure safety.

The current weight limit on the bridge is seven tons for single-axle vehicles, and three tons for tractor-trailers. When the structure was inspected last year, an initial recommendation was made to reduce the weight limit to three tons for a single-axle vehicle. Although only about 110 vehicles used it each day, heavier vehicles such as logging trucks and farm equipment also used it.

After additional review by NCDOT's Division 10 staff and Structures Management staff in Raleigh, engineers recommended closing the bridge until it could be scheduled for replacement.

The contract has a floating availability date between this September and March 2019 Once work gets underway, the contractor will have 210 days to complete the project. Vegetation and reforestation work can continue after the bridge opens to traffic.

This was one of 18 road, rail and bridge contracts recently awarded by the N.C. Department of Transportation. Per state law they went to the lowest qualified bidder for each project. The contracts are worth \$144.4 million.
