June 24 Saturation Patrol in Wadesboro Nets Numerous Charges

On Friday, June 24 the Wadesboro Police Department conducted a Saturation Patrol on Highway 74 Business. Joining Wadesboro Police officers were officers representing five other agencies, including Lilesville, Norwood, Hamlet, Laurinburg and Pinehurst Police Departments. Officers were focusing on speeders in several different locations to help promote traffic safety.

Officers also conducted a license checking station on Highway 52 South later that night to ensure unlicensed drivers were not operating a motor vehicle, and to deter anyone from drinking and driving.

During the Saturation Patrol for speeders a total of 56 charges were issued: 13 drug charges, including felony possession of cocaine; 1 driving while license revoked; 1 revoked license tag; and 42 speeding violations, all of which were greater than 15 mph over the posted limit.

At the license checking station officers wrote a total of 25 charges: 9 seatbelt violations; 3 child restraint violations; 4 driving while license revoked; 4 no operators license; and 5 window tint violations.

In 2015 alone there were 322 speed-related fatalities and 10,658 speed-related injuries. Speeding was a contributing factor in 23 percent of all fatal crashes in North Carolina. In 2015, 88 percent of all speeding-related traffic fatalities in North Carolina occurred on non interstate roadways where the posted speed limits were 55 mph or less. Only 8 percent of the state's speeding related fatalities occurred on interstate highways that year.

The Wadesboro Police Department would like to remind everyone that these traffic laws serve a purpose to promote safety and help prevent traffic accidents, injuries and even death. Please be smart and obey all traffic laws and watch for other drivers.

Anson County's Unemployment Rate Was at 5.3 Percent in May

Anson County's unemployment rate for May was 5.3 percent. In April the rate was 5.8 percent. Statewide the unemployment rate for May was 4.7% percent.

Anson's total labor force in May was 10,865. Of that number 10,294 were employed and 571 were unemployed. In April the total labor force was 10,946, with 10,313 employed and 633 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 98 of North Carolina's counties in May and remained unchanged in two. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 8.6 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.5 percent.

Fourteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases and one remained unchanged. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mountat 6.9 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.7 percent. The May not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.7 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 15 metro areas experienced rate

decreases over the year. The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in May by 13,221 to 4,626,542 while those unemployed decreased 12,386 to 229,979. Since May 2015 the number of workers em-

ployed statewide increased 88,625, while those unem-

ployed decreased 60,005.

Wadesboro Police Charge Danny Wade Pearson with Five Felonies

The charges were the result of an investigation into Pearson's involvement in illegal activity at his place of business, Pearson's Truck Service, located on Highway 74 West in Wadesboro.

The Wadesboro Police Department received a complaint on Friday, June 17 from a victim who reported that her

Know the Warning Signs and Symptoms of Stroke

Make sure you can spot the symptoms in yourself and in others

Strokes are one of the top three causes of death in the United States and the leading cause of long-term disability. What's more, North Carolina is located in what researchers call the stroke belt, meaning the death rates for stroke are highest in this area compared to the rest of the United States

While most stroke cases are unpredictable, identifying warning signs as soon as possible can make a big difference in how someone is treated for and recovers from a stroke.

'Symptoms can include weakness on one side of the body, numbness, confusion, fatigue, dizziness, blurred vision, a severe headache and potentially paralysis," says Joe Bernard, MD, an interventional radiologist at Carolinas HealthCare System. "However, each stroke case has its own unique combination of signs and symptoms, so not everyone will experience all of them simultaneously nor at the same level of intensity.

F.A.S.T is an easy way to remember the signs of stroke. If you spot these signs in your self or a loved one, you should call 911 immediately.

• Face Drooping: Does one side of the face droop, or is it numb? Ask the person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven?

 Arm Weakness: Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

 Speech Difficulty: Is speech slurred? Is the person unable to speak or hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "The sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

• Time to call 911. If someone shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 9-1-1 and get the person to the hospital immediately. Check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared.

Some lifestyle choices and medical conditions can put you at a higher risk of stroke. Some examples include:

- Poor nutrition
- · Lack of physical activity
- Smoking
- High stress
- High blood pressure

By making an effort every day to move more, eat more fruits and vegetables, get more sleep, quit smoking and regularly checking your blood pressure, you can cut down on your risk of having a stroke.
