North Carolina Telephone Company

Not many remember when Fred Fincher did most of the phone service for Anson Phone Company in Wadesboro. That was when one of several telephone operators said, "Number please," then plugged you into your "asked for number or name." There were no dial phones here, certainly no "cell" phones or any of this stuff of today's telephone messaging.

In my mind I can still see those operators with ear phones, using both hands "plugging in" numbers that were asked for!! Some of this was my "era of time." At that time our shop number was 40 - no prefix, no area code -"just 40," when we began our business in 1947.

The truck above is the second one after Anson Phone became North Carolina Telephone Company – and, as always, it was hand designed and painted, even the painted phone on the door which, believe it or not, was like some of the early desk type phones! They were all a "far cry" from some of the older boxy oak wood wall phones that preceded!

There were quite a few people through the years who we have known – not only the operators, but also service and office personnel. I remember one Monday holiday when so many people were not working. Naturally someone "knocked down" a telephone pole. All the service personnel were off, leaving an area with no phone service. Manager Jack Miller came by shop all upset, so I took my Suburban and ladder to his rescue, and that was the nearest that I have ever come to "working the telephone business!"

Many of the "old timers" have gone on, but many are still here to cary on though!! A great group of people!

Help for Those in Need of Prescription Medications

From Dustin Adcock, Local Foods Agent, Cooperative Extension: To many county residents a small red brick building in between Windsor and Franklin streets of Monroe is just another business. They would be amazed to know the impact of the non-profit organization HealthQuest that resides there. I have come to greatly appreciate this organization and the multitude of volunteers and staff that put their life into providing such a meaningful service.

So, what is HealthQuest? HealthQuest of Monroe is a non-profit pharmacy that provides prescription maintenance medications to people who cannot afford them and who do not have prescription insurance. Director Heather Horne says that residents of Union, Anson, and Stanly counties in North Carolina and Chesterfield and Lancaster counties of South Carolina, who meet their income and eligibility requirements, may enroll in the program to receive services. Many citizens go without necessary medications due to financial constraints. Some individuals have to choose between food and medication. Thanks to volunteer pharmacists and a small staff, these individuals can come and receive up to six of their most expensive and critical prescriptions for free. HealthQuest does not however dispense narcotics or controlled substances. As a local foods agent with the NC Cooperative Extension, I have come to see a great value in this organization. Heather has reached out to promote healthy eating and local foods to her clientele. The goal here is not to sustain people, but get them what they need to make a better life and improve their health. A staggering 35% of their clients have been identified as "zero income". Also, the majority of their clients are under the age of 62. In 2014, HealthQuest provided \$9.8 million worth of vital prescriptions to these individuals in need. In just a short conversation with Heather, her volunteers, and staff I came to realize that this organization was integral to my community and my job as a local foods agent. This organization is one of the most efficient, ethical, and affective organizations I have had the privilege to work with. For every \$1 that is donated or provided to HealthQuest, \$14.23 of medications are dispensed to people who desperately need them.
