Local Law Requiring Written Permission to **Hunt Is Nothing New**

Since 1987 in Anson County, hunting on someone else's land has required written permission by the property owner. This year, notice of that existing law in the 2008-2009 North Carolina Inland Fishing, Hunting and Trapping Regulations Digest was erroneously listed in red print, indicating a major regulation change or a new law. It is neither.

Approved in the 1987 session of the General Assembly, and effective October 1, 1987, the law states "it is unlawful to hunt on another's land without having on the person written permission signed and dated by the owner, lessee, or club president (if applicable). Permission is good for one year unless otherwise stated. During the gun deer season, allowing a dog under one's ownership, possession, or control to run upon or across another's land constitutes hunting thereon."

It also remains unlawful to hunt at any time on, from, or across any public road or highway in Anson County.

Successful completion of a Hunter Education course, offered free by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission throughout the state, is required for all first-time hunting license buyers. The 2008-2009 North Carolina Inland Fishing, Hunting and Trapping Regulations Digest is available online at www.ncwildlife.org or from local Wildlife Service agents.
