418 people charged for drinking and driving over July 4th Holiday

The NC Wildlife Resources Commission, along with the State Highway Patrol and the Alcohol Law Enforcement division, has released results of the "On the Road, On the Water, Don't Drink and Drive" campaign for the July 4 through July 7 holiday period.

Of the 418 people charged with drinking and driving over the July 4 holiday weekend, 50 were charged by Wildlife Enforcement Officers for operating a vessel while impaired. Summary information from the Wildlife Commission, State Highway Patrol and Alcohol Law Enforcement follows:

Wildlife Resources Commission - Operating While Impaired: 50 • Boating Citations:

State Highway Patrol - Driving While Impaired: 368 • Seatbelt Violations: 1,518 • Child Restraint Violations: 176 • Total Violations: 9,239

Alcohol Law Enforcement - ALE officers made five arrests, including an Underage Possession of Alcohol charge and a Carrying a Concealed Weapon violation.

The "On the Road, On the Water, Don't Drink and Drive" campaign is a multi-agency initiative designed to ensure that all motorists travel safely on highways and waterways during the summer. Campaign patrols focus on three key summer travel holiday weekends: Memorial Day, Fourth ot July and Labor Day.

NCDOT Announces "Booze It & Lose It: Operation Firecracker" Campaign Yields 1,737 DWI Arrests

DWI Task Forces aide local agencies to keep drunk drivers off the road

The North Carolina Department of Transportation and the Governor's Highway Safety Program announced today that nearly 1,800 DWI arrests were made during "Booze It & Lose It: Operation Firecracker" over the Independence Day holiday, which was held June 28-July $7.\,$ "Law enforcement officials statewide continue to play a pivotal role in keeping those who drink and drive off the roads," said Don Nail, director of the NC Governor's Highway Safety Program. "Year round and especially during 'Booze It & Lose It' officers are going above and beyond the call of duty to keep our highways safe.

To help combat drunk driving, and make our roads safer, over the Independence Day holiday and throughout the year, the Governor's Highway Safety Program – in conjunction with the NC Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration – has provided grants to create DWI task forces in areas with the highest number of DWI-related deaths. There are currently seven DWI task forces across the state whose sole purpose is to get

drunk drivers off the roads. Those seven counties that have DWI task forces were responsible for 455 of the 1,737 DWI arrests.

Guilford County is one of the newest task forces and is already making an impact. During the 2012 "Operation Firecracker" campaign there were 50 DWI arrests and in 2013 there were 146 DWI arrests.

In addition to DWI arrests, there were a total of 56,774 traffic and criminal citations issued statewide. Officers issued $4{,}194$ safety belt and 729 child passenger safety violations, $15{,}972$ speeding violations and 1,665 drug charges. In addition, they apprehended 1,379 fugitives from justice and recovered 92 stolen vehicles.

This picture shows uptown Wadesboro in the early 1940's on a Saturday. This is looking up West Wade Street from the southwest corner of Wade and Rutherford Streets. The Kyle's sign on the right is mounted on the building that was last used as Mack's Record Rack in the recent past.

The United States was in the depths of World War II at this time, and if you look closely you can see several men in uniform on the sidewalks. Nonetheless, a Saturdav in uptown Wadesboro was a lively time with lots of people on the sidewalks and many different stores selling everything anyone could want or need.

Such a busy scene on a Saturday in Wadesboro was a normal thing until the 1970's. It was not uncommon for families to drive to town just to spend the day walking shopping, eating at the many restaurants or taking in a movie. It was a social event! Wadesboro even had two movie theatres at one time. Also, farmers would come to town to bring their goods to sell and to purchase provisions. H. W. Little & Company was a popular gathering place for the farmers, with benches out front for them to visit

You will notice on the right side of the street that all those buildings are gone now except for Parsons Drug. On the left you can see the Fox & Lyon Building on the square and the former Woods dime store just below it, both destroyed by fire in 1983.

Oh yes, there was not a stoplight in Anson County at the time of this picture! Anson's first traffic signal was placed on the square in the early 1970's.
