"What is amateur radio," you ask? According to the American Radio Relay League (ARRL),"Amateur radio (ham radio) is a popular hobby and service that brings people, electronics and communication together. People use ham radio to talk across town, around the world, or even into space, all without the internet or cell phones. It's fun, social, educational, and can be a lifeline during times of need." *arrl.com*

There are cases reported where "hams," as they are often called, aided in rescue operations during the hurricanes last fall. When flood waters on the coast knocked out cell phone towers and there were no other means of communicating to rescue officials the location or condition of victims, "hams" who were present among the victims fired up their "rigs" to make the call for help. Many operators can work closely with county and state officials to provide emergency preparedness drills and training. In the case where local officials lose their own communications, amateur radio operators can assist in getting back-up communications in place to aid in rescue efforts. Some operators participate in "contesting" whereby "hams" try to establish contacts across great distances, even around the world. To be a "ham," all amateurs are required to be licensed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). These tests are designed to test the operator's ability to comprehend the rules as well as electronics theory, basic and advanced operations, as well as antenna theory based on a "class" of license.

"The Mobile Free Pharmacy event is an opportunity for us to make an impact on the health and wellness of the community. We look forward to helping provide health resources and education to individuals and families in this community. "NC MedAssist is excited to host a Mobile Free Pharmacy event in Anson County," stated NC MedAssist CEO, Lori Giang. She shared, "Together with our community partners, we are bringing free over-the-counter medications, like Tylenol and Band-Aids, to area residents.
