Woman Killed in Sunday Night Shooting in Wadesboro

A woman was killed in a shooting that took place on Sunday night, July 16. Ella Campbell died after shots were fired in a home on Dogwood Street in Wadesboro. James Taylor was also shot, and was taken to the hospital in critical condition. No information has been released as to what led to the incident. No arrests have been made.

Investigators have learned that a large crowd of people were in the home at the time of the shooting. Over 40 people have been interviewed, and the police are seeking more witnesses.

North Carolina Citizens Will Save Millions in State Health Plan

North Carolina Treasurer Dale R. Folwell, CPA, announced today that the State Health Plan (Plan) will save approximately \$8.5 million beginning in January 2018 as a result of new terms negotiated for the administration of NC HealthSmart, the Plan's healthy living initiative that is administered by Active Health Management. The program offers health and wellness resources and services to support Plan members' personal health goals.

The renegotiated contract is for the first nine months of 2018 and places additional limits on the scope of the services provided. The Plan is refocusing its population health management strategy to the five diseases that are the largest drivers of cost: chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), congestive heart failure, coronary artery disease, diabetes and hypertension. In addition, the Plan seeks to eliminate duplication of services already provided by other vendors.

"We believe that it is essential that the Plan focus on those who need the resources the most and where we can make the biggest impact," said Treasurer Folwell. "In addition, we are looking to partner with other groups that provide similar services either free to the public, or through existing contractual relationships, to continue to offer Plan members the resources they need to get healthy."

Treasurer Folwell pointed to the fact that a single patient could have up to five different case managers provided through the Plan for any one illness. "We need to be more efficient in the delivery of population health management services," added Folwell. "It will create the best possible path for a good outcome for the Plan member, and for the state's taxpayers."

The State Health Plan, a division of the Department of State Treasurer, provides health care coverage to more than 700,000 teachers, state employees, retirees, current and former lawmakers, state university and community college personnel, and their dependents.

Solar Power Educational Program On May 27

A solar education program is being held that will explain the technology, construction, regulations, and economics of the utility-scale solar photovoltaic (PV) systems that are increasing across North Carolina. Scheduled for Thursday, July 27, from 6:00 until 8:00 p.m., this event is being offered through Cooperative Extension and presented by the NC Clean Energy Technology Center, a division of the College of Engineering at NC State University.

The program will take place at the Union County Agricultural Services and Conference Center, located at 3230-D Presson Road in Monroe.

In addition to providing an understanding of the development and operation of these solar electricity generating facilities, attendees will learn about the various impacts of these systems on the community and the environment. Specifically, presenters will address common questions about PV panel toxicity, EMF/radiation, economic impacts, system decommissioning, and more. Presenters will also discuss the characteristics that make a site most suitable for solar and provide an overview of solar land leases.

In addition, an opportunity for attendee questions and answers will be provided after a 50-minute presentation. Tommy Cleveland, Solar PV Engineer, P.E., Advanced Energy and Steve Kalland, Executive Director, NC Clean Energy Technology Center N.C. State University, will lead the program.

North Carolina is experiencing rapid growth in utility scale solar. The Solar Energy Industries Association ranked North Carolina number two in the United States for cumulative installed solar capacity in 2016.

The objectives of the upcoming program are to educate landowners and elected officials, and to answer questions about solar opportunities within the County.

These topics may include: solar basics, environmental health and safety issues, landowner considerations, land use and impacts, local regulatory topics, solar policy, local economic implications, and also non-utility scale solar topics (such as residential, commercial and community solar).
