Save the Yadkin

This is a release from the LandTrust for Central North Carolina: Join us on this once in a generation opportunity. We are excited to announce the launching of our "Save the Yadkin" campaign in order to purchase 4,700 acres and 76 miles of shoreline owned by the Aluminum Company of America (ALCOA). These lands are made available as part of the Relicensing Settlement Agreement signed by Alcoa in 2007

The LandTrust is working to conserve the 2,310 acres that are located along the Yadkin River, the South Yadkin River and High Rock Lake first. The purchase price for this land is \$7.7 million. The LandTrust and other partners have raised \$5.3 million already towards the purchase. That leaves an additional \$2.4 million to be raised. The funds raised includes a \$500,000 "challenge grant" — which means that for every dollar raised of the next \$500,000 that money is matched dollar for dollar.

The clock is ticking on the time remaining to "Save the Yadkin." The LandTrust has until September of 2019 (a little over a year) to raise the remaining funds to purchase the High Rock Lake portion. To do so would grant an additional two years to buy the 2,390 acres on Tuckertown Lake. The LandTrust will not own these lands; they will be owned by the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission and will be open for public recreation.

Why is this land worth conserving?

- Public Access: The Alcoa Game Lands offer public access to recreational activities like hunting, fishing, and boating. With 80% of NC's population living within 100 miles of the project center, public access opportunities sustain the local outdoor recreation/tourism economies. Water Quality: More than 1.7 million people rely on water from the Yadkin-Pee Dee River Basin every day
- for consumption, personal use, recreation, agriculture, power generation, and commercial use. Wildlife Habitat: Having 76 miles of undeveloped shoreline, permanently conserving this property means con-

serving habitat for a variety of unique species including bald eagles and timber rattlesnakes.

The lands represented by this project are currently privately held (owned by ALCOA) but have been open and accessible as "game lands" to the public for over 30 years. Generations of North Carolinians have enjoyed access to these lands for a variety of recreational activities including camping, hiking, rock climbing, paddling, hunting and fishing. Without this purchase, these lands could be sold on the open market and the public recreation currently enjoyed would be lost.

Wildlife Commission Adopts Temporary Rules

During a business meeting on Thursday, July 12, the N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission amended three existing rules using temporary rulemaking. The rules were amended as follows. All changes will apply to the 2018-2019 hunting seasons:

Amendments to the Importation of Animal Parts Rule restrict importation of cervid carcass parts and prohibits

importation of whole cervid carcasses from outside of North Carolina, increasing protection of North Carolina's whitetailed deer and elk populations from chronic wasting disease. Cervids are the family of mammals that includes whitetailed deer, elk, mule deer, caribou and moose. For the new cervid carcass importation regulations visit ncwildlife.org/Hunting.

The amendment to the Bear Rule clarifies that there is no open season for hunting bear in any area of the Green Swamp Bear Sanctuary, which spans parts of Brunswick and Columbus counties.

Amendments to the Hunting on Game Lands Rule adds the extended archery season antlered deer on the South Mountains and Buffalo Cove game lands to align with the Western Deer Season and clarifies that deer of either sex can be taken on the first open Saturday of the Deer with Visible Antlers Season on the Cold Mountain Game
