

#### **Devonte Amor Horne** Wanted for Murder of Randal Vontray Sturdivant, Jr.

On Sunday, July 16 at approximately 2:16 a.m. the Wadesboro Police Department responded to Atrium Health Anson about a man who arrived with a gunshot wound. The man, 26 year old Randal Vontray Sturdivant, Jr. of Wadesboro, was pronounced dead at Atrium Health Anson shortly after arrival. Officers immediately initiated an investigation and were able to locate the crime scene near the 300 block of Myrtlewood Drive in Wadesboro. No other individuals are believed to be injured in this incident.

On Tuesday, July 18, 2023, Investigators with the Wadesboro Police Department obtained a warrant for the arrest of Devonte Amor Horne, charging him with First Degree Murder.

Devonte Amor Horne remains at large, and the Wadesboro Police Department is asking for the community's help in

bringing him to justice. Anyone with any information as to Horne's whereabouts is requested to call (704) 694-2167.

Horne's description: 23 years old, 6'4" tall, 200 pounds, slender build, long dreads, African American. He is considered armed and dangerous.

# **NC's June Employment Figures**

The state's seasonally adjusted June 2023 unemployment rate was 3.3 percent, decreasing 0.1 of a percentage point from May's revised rate. The national rate decreased 0.1 of a percentage point to 3.6 percent.

North Carolina's unemployment rate decreased 0.3 of a percentage point from a year ago. The number of people employed increased 14,582 over the month to 5,047,816 and increased 60,958 over the year. The number of people unemployed decreased 3,058 over the month to 172,680 and decreased 12,620 over the year.

Seasonally adjusted Total Nonfarm employment, as gathered through the monthly establishment survey, increased 4,900 to 4,909,800 in June. Major industries experiencing increases were Professional & Business Services, 3,500; Manufacturing, 2,000; Education & Health Services, 1,600; Leisure & Hospitality Services, 1,200; Information, 400; Financial Activities, 200; Government, 100; and Mining & Logging, 100. Major industries experiencing decreases were Construction, 2,900; Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 1,000; and Other Services, 300.

Since June 2022, Total Nonfarm jobs increased 106,600 and Government increasing by 3,800. Major industries experiencing increases were Leisure & Hospitality Services, 27,500; Education & Health Services, 26,500; Professional & Business Services, 23,200; Trade. Transportation & Utilities, 10,300; Other Services, 6,400; Manufacturing, 5,800; Government, 3,800; Financial Activities, 3,400; Information, 2,600; Construction, 800; and Mining & Logging, 100.

August eighth was the official beginning of Anson Snior High's 1994 football season. From seven o'clock A.M. until eight o'clock P.M., the athletes underwent a total of three long and intense practices during the four-day football camp. Needless to say, football camp, coupled with lengthy afterschool practices, payed off. The Varsity Bearcats broke the school record with the most wins in a season—an overall record of eleven and three (11-3). Each and every coach and player should be commended for his hard work, including Elton Taylor (offensive tackle). Several of his teammates agreed that Elton's "heart and dedication helped motivate the team to the play-offs."

"We had a great year," commented Coach Charlie Lockhart. "The highlight of the season was beating Richmond." The 28-13 victory over the rival team put Anson into the play-offs, a feat that has only happened twice in school history. Once in the play-offs, a 28-27 overtime victory at West Forsyth became the Bearcats' first ever road win in the play-offs.

Bernard Henry tied the state record of seven touchdowns in a single game and broke the school record of 324 yards rushing. The junior was also named North Carolina's 4A Associated Press Player of the Week and made the All-Piedmont team. Jimmy Lindsey and Damien Bennett also received honorable mention. The Bearcats boasted four first-team all-conference players: Antonio Thomas, Gregg Griggs, Bernard Henry, and Antonio Moore. Second-team all conference players were Theo Wall, Damien Bennett, Thomas Legrand, Keith Lilly, Joe Ratliff, Jimmy Lindsey, Robert Gillespie, Maurice Pratt, and Travis Cash. Dusty Thomas and Rex Coble received honorable mention.

The excitement and pride of the Varsity Bearcats football team certainly rubbed off on the students, faculty, and community. "Bearcat fans are the greatest," said one football player. The Bearcats dedicated their season to former Bearcat football great, Carlos Smith, and retired his jersey on October seventh during Homecoming.


