



Anson County Partnership for Children is accepting applications for NC Pre-K, a Kindergarten readiness initiative that is proven to help four-year-olds gain basic skills needed for success in elementary school. Children who are four years of age before August 31, 2023, are eligible to apply for this high-quality program, which is free to qualifying families.

"Pre-K is a place where children learn skills that are vital to child development. NC Pre-K children learn how to socialize, make their own decisions, and interact with others. These are all important skills for child development. To make the transition to kindergarten easier, children learn eye contact, gain self-confidence, develop work efficiency, create a stronger attention span, and work on temper control," said Karen Gerald, Child Care Services Coordinator, Anson County Partnership for Children.

Not only are children who attended Pre-K more successful in school, they usually have higher grade point averages and are more likely to graduate high school and college.

NC Pre-K classes operate on a regular school calendar and are designed to address emotional and social development, physical health, language development, and cognitive functioning. Through the incorporation of indoor and outdoor learning environments, students participate in active learning experiences to foster a lifetime love of learning.

A high priority is placed on serving children who meet the following criteria: child's family is at or below 75% of the state median income level, a disability has been identified, limited English proficiency, developmental differences, chronic health conditions, or a parent who is active military service personnel.

There are currently four centers operating NC Pre-K classes in Anson County. These classrooms are located at Anson Children's Center, Central Center for Children and Families, C's & T's Childcare, Morven Elementary School, and Open Doors Center for Children.

#### Groundbreaking Alzheimer's Research Revealed at Alzheimer's Association International Conference

With more than 6 million Americans and 180,000 North Carolinians living with Alzheimer's disease today, researchers are working tirelessly to advance science that will lead to earlier detection, preventions and additional new treatments for Alzheimer's and all dementia.

In July, more than 11,000 researchers attended the Alzheimer's Association International Conference (AAIC) 2023 both in person in Amsterdam, Netherlands, and virtually to share the latest in Alzheimer's and dementia science. Highlights include:

•Advances in treatment offer even more hope. Data by Eli Lilly from the TRAILBLAZER-ALZ 2 Phase 3 clinical trial of donanemab found the drug significantly slowed cognitive and functional decline in people with early symptomatic Alzheimer's disease. The company has submitted this data to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration with a decision expected by the end of the year. •Report of the first-ever U.S. county-level Alzheimer's prevalence estimates. A

new report published in Alzheimer's & Dementia: The Journal of the Alzheimer's Association, and presented at AAIC 2023, shows every county in North Carolina having an Alzheimer's prevalence rate of 8.9 percent or higher in their 65+ population. •Volunteering later in life may promote a healthy brain. A study of an ethnic and racially diverse population of older adults found that volunteering was associated with better baseline scores on tests of memory, thinking and planning.

 Advancements in blood tests for Alzheimer's. Researchers found a simple, finger prick blood test shows promise in the ability to detect markers of Alzheimer's using a single drop of blood. If validated, this test could offer a quick, noninvasive and cost-effective option that is simple enough to be performed independently.

 Chronic constipation may be bad for your cognition. A new report shows individuals with bowel movements every three days or more had significantly worse cognition, equivalent to three years more of chronological cognitive aging, than those with healthy

•Hearing aids slow cognitive decline in older adults with hearing loss and who are at risk for cognitive decline. Results from a large clinical trial finds hearing aids and ongoing auditory counseling cut cognitive decline in half for older adults who had hearing problems and who were at higher risk of cognitive decline.

ullet Opioid use is associated with increased death in people with dementia. Researchers found new opioid use in older adults with dementia is associated with a significantly increased risk of death, including an eleven fold increase in the first two weeks. There is great progress in Alzheimer's and dementia research," said Katherine L.

Lambert, CEO of the Alzheimer's Association - Western Carolina Chapter. "This year at AAIC, we gained insights into treatment, early and accurate diagnosis, and our understanding of risk factors for Alzheimer's and other dementias. The work of the scientific community holds great promise for the future worldwide, and in our own backyard here in North Carolina.'

Of the more than 3,000 scientific presentations from the conference, 117 presentations were from North Carolina-based researchers and investigators from: Duke University, East Carolina University, NC State University, North Carolina A&T University, several campuses of the University of North Carolina System, Wake Forest University
