Supporting Bees & Native Pollinators

Everyone has heard about the decline and loss of honey bees in the past several years. Besides the honey bees, there are many other native bees, wasps, and other insects, as well as butterflies, moths, birds, and bats that serve as pollinators in our gardens that are on the decline as well. As a homeowner, you may think, what can I do? Can I make a difference? The answer is yes you can!

Here are a few ways you can help the bees & other pollinators:

 Plant flowers such as comos & coneflowers that have open petals & upright stamens that provide easy access for our pollen-loving friends



• Choose flowers like penstemon & salvia that are heavy pollen producers

 Many herbs provide food and seasonings for us as well as bees and other pollinators, so if you don't have them in your garden, consider adding them

Provide shelter by planting a variety of plants such as standing grasses, flowers with hollow stalks, shrubs, and even trees
Not all weeds need to be eradicated; see if

the bees and butterflies are enjoying the buffet they offer and if they are, leave them be! • Plan your garden so something is blooming from very early spring to late fall

Plant cover crops and use compost in place of synthetic fertilizers

• Provide nesting spots, by leaving some open ground without mulch for ground-nesters or make artificial pollinator nesting habitats – you can easily find instructions on the internet

• Limit or eliminate pesticide usage, especially when plants are flowering

• If you have open spaces like fields, roadsides, etc. plant with native wildflower seed mixes. Check the North Carolina Native Plant Society webpage for a list of nurseries that sell native plants & seeds as it is always best to use plants and seeds that come from our area. There are several nurseries in Union County and the region. You can find them on the North Carolina Native Plant Society website: *ncwildflower.org*.

Hammerhead Worm Sightings

Recent heavy rains seem to be bringing hammerhead flatworms out of hiding. If you haven't noticed them before, they have a head similar to a hammerhead shark.

There are 5 species of hammerhead worms. They are also called planarians and terrestrial flatworms, Non-native hammerhead worms have been in North Carolina since the 1950's. They are typically orange, yellow, or brown, shiny, slimy, with a

flattened body. They range from just a few millimeters to 12" long. Generalist predators, they feed on earthworms, snails, slugs, insect larvae, springtails and other invertebrates.

Health threats: Do not mistake them for earthworms. Two members of the hammerhead genus, Bipalium produce the same toxin as pufferfish which is thought to help them overcome prey and self-defense. If these worms are handled it is advised to avoid touching eyes and mouths and wash hands thoroughly. Some species carry the infective stages of an internal parasite, rat lungworm. While infection is possible, it is rare since one would potentially have to eat the worm to

Ralph graduated from Bowman High School, then went on to The Citadel where he majored in political science while playing football. Following graduation in 1974, he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps where he would serve for 30 years on active duty as a CH-53 helicopter pilot, flight instructor, and Commanding Officer of units at every level. His commands included HMH-464 during Operation Desert Storm and MAG-29 of New River Air Station. He returned to The Citadel for his final duty station as the Commanding Officer of the NROTC Unit.

During his active duty service, he earned a Master of Science in Management from Troy State University and a Master of Arts in National Security Strategy from the National War College.

Following retirement from the Marine Corps, Ralph served as the Broker-in-Charge of his family's real estate company and continued serving his community as the President of The Citadel Alumni Association and The Citadel Foundation.
