Anson County's June Unemployment Rate Higher

Anson County's unemployment rate for June was 11.5%. In May the rate was 10.4%. The state of North Carolina's unemployment rate for June was 9.3%, up slightly from May's 8.9%. It is not unusual for Anson County to experience an approximate 1 percent higher unemployment rate each June. In June 2012 Anson County's unemployment rate was 12.7%, up from May 2012's 11.7% rate. May and June 2013 unemployment rates are trending at one percent lower than 2012.

Anson's total labor force in June was 10,998. Of that number 9,734 were employed and 1,264 were unemployed. In May the total labor force was 10,997, with 9,852 employed and 1,145 unemployed. Anson County lost 118 jobs over the month of June. This ranks Anson County employment 83rd out of North Carolina's 100 counties. In June 2011 Anson County had 8,474 employed, and in June 2012 9,724 were employed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 81 of North Carolina's counties in June, decreased in 14 and remained the same in five. All 14 of the State's metro areas

Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 16.2 percent while Currituck County had the lowest at 5.8 percent. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 13.3 percent

experienced the highest rate and Asheville at 7.1 percent had the lowest. The June not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 9.3 percent. When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates

increased in 12 counties, fell in 85 and remained unchanged in three. One metro area experienced a rate increase, while 13 experienced rate decreases. The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in

June by 16,445 to 4,303,424, while those unemployed increased 16,163 to 439,793. Since June 2012, the number of workers employed statewide increased 11,966, while those unemployed decreased 26,257.

Spotlight on Anson County Cooperative Extension

Over the next weeks The Express will feature articles about staff members of the Anson County Cooperative Extension, and examples of success they are having sharing their expertise with all of us. Their mission stattement is: North Carolina Cooperative Extension partners with communities to deliver education and technology that enrich the lives, land and economy of North Carolinians.

We will start with a report from Janine Rywak, County Extension Director:

The down economy and slow recovery have played havoc on everyone, including Cooperative Extension. Government agencies are currently facing more potential funding cuts from both federal and state levels. As state and county employees, we are challenged to make sure our programs are relevant, our budgets are streamlined and our efforts are transparent. Daily we rise to that challenge. Anson County Cooperative Extension boasts a proud history of programming to community

needs and we work to continue that tradition. For example, last year we provided educational programs that included: a Southern Piedmont Winter Beef Conference for 65 producers who learned about utilizing forages and soil fertility, indicating a total potential cost savings of \$82,000; an after-school program with 92% of court referred participants completing with no new adjudications or complaints; a shiitake mushroom workshop where Anson County producers diversified into production with 2013 yields expected to quadruple in response to demand from dependable and profitable markets; a summer 4-H day camp program of five weeks in collaboration with 13 different partners for 109 youth; a poultry composting workshop where 100% of the respondents indicated they would use or consider composting mass mortality and 67% would consider making a mass mortality plan for their farms; and the 10,000th acre was enrolled in the Anson County Voluntary Agricultural Districts farmland preservation program, representing 49 farms and 135 tracts of land.

Our staff is proud of the work we do, and proud to serve Anson County.

Tips for Cleaning

the Outdoor Grill Outdoor grilling is one of summer's delights. Even basic foods seem to taste better cooked outdoors. Whether the grill of choice is charcoal or gas, keeping your

grill clean is important. Here are some tips for peak performance all summer long. Begin by checking the grill manufacturer's instructions for

specific cleaning requirements. Rust is the major enemy of charcoal grills, and the major cause of rust is failing to clean out the ashes regularly. To do this, turn off the grill, make sure it is completely cool. If there is no ash catcher underneath the bowl, use a garden trowel to scoop out the ashes. If the grill has an ash catcher, be sure to clean it too, once the ashes are removed. Carefully discard the ashes in a plastic trash bag. Otherwise, they will fly all over, covering everything,

including yourself, with soot.

Clean the grate and the inside of the grill with a sprayon cleaner. Check the label to make sure the cleaning product is safe for both these surfaces, and follow the grill manufacturer's use instructions. Let the cleaner sit long enough to soften the accumulated grease and grime. Then, wipe the cleaner with paper towels. Follow by washing with a hand dishwashing detergent and water. Clean the outside of the grill, too, using a warm detergent and water solution and a non-abrasive cloth. Rinse and wipe dry. Gas grills should be

checked to make sure there are no leaks or blockages. Make sure the grill is turned off and completely cool. Then, inspect the burner and gas supply tubes for spider webs, grease build-up, rusted areas or anything that would slow down the gas flow. Clean these areas following the grill manufacturer's cleaning instructions.

Clean a gas grill after every use by turning the grill on high and letting it cook for 10 to 15 minutes with the lid closed. Then, loosen the residue with a brass bristle brush. Once the grill is completely cool, wipe the inside and outside surfaces with a soft cloth and warm, soapy water. Rinse and wipe dry.
