### Report Finds Status of NC Women Improving, Challenges Remain

The NC Department of Administration's Council for Women has released a report entitled the Status of Women in North Carolina. The report is the latest research on women in North Carolina and tracks the progress and disparity in opportunities and outcomes for women

since 1996. The report will be unveiled on Monday at the NC Women's Roundtable in Greensboro, NC.

The report will reveal that women made significant progress over the past 15 years by increasing representation in the state's elective executive positions, holding a higher proportion of state legislative seats, and narrowing the gender wage gap. However, the report will show that women continue to be underrepresented in the Carolina General Assembly relative to their share of the population, and that women still earn less than their male counterparts, only 83 cents on the dollar when compared to men.

"This report shows that North Carolina's women are becoming better educated, more prosperous and more politically influential than ever before," said Beth Briggs, Director of the NC Council for Women. "But it is clear that an equality gap still exists between where women are and where women should be

in relation to men.

The report was prepared by the Institute for Women's Policy Research with funding public-private partnership which included the NC Council for Women, the Wells Fargo Foundation, Women for Women with the Community Foundation of Western NC, Women to Women with the Community Foundation of Greensboro, and the Women's Giving Circle of Cumberland County. Other funders and the full text of the report will be available at www.councilforwomen.nc.gov on Monday.

The Status of Women in North Carolina report was released and discussed at the NC Women's Roundtable in March in Greensboro, NC. Speakers included: Dr. Jo Allen, President of Meredith College; Susan Brown, Market President for Wells Fargo in High Point; and Ariane Hegewisch, Study Director for the Institute of Women's Policy Research. information presented at the roundtable event included Meredith College's new report on the Status of Girls in NC and the NC Women United draft agenda from the 2012-
