Thieves Steal Bronze Vases from Anson Memorial Park Cemetery

Anson County Sheriff's deputies are investigating the theft of over 150 bronze flower vases from graves at Anson Memorial Park. Sheriff Tommy Allen said that over the past month thieves have struck three times. "It's very frustrating for us to see this kind of heartless thievery. It's very sad for the families to have these vases removed from their loved one's graves. These are the lowest class of thieves who steal from cemeteries and churches. I really can't tell you how bad we want to get our hands on these individuals," Allen said.

The bronze vases when purchased new cost over \$130each. They can be melted down and sold as scrap to junk dealers for a few cents on the dollar. Allen said that there is also an international market where the bronze vases are actually ground into small pieces and shipped overseas, generally to China.

The Sheriff said that he had met with Harvey Leavitt of Leavitt Funeral Home and was told that the remaining vases were being removed by the Memorial Park staff until the situation settled down. "Mr. Leavitt said that he would be notifying the families of this and any future changes," Allen said.

Rockingham Man Wrecks, Florida **Charges Against Him Discovered**



On Wednesday morning, August 1 at 8:57 a.m. a call came in to the 911 center about an accident on Highway 74. A dump truck driven by Michael Odell Sibley, 33, of Rockingham turned over on Highway 74 West near the Anson and Union County line. During the investigation of the accident officers with the State Highway Patrol

discovered that Sibley was wanted on charges in Florida, including Grand Theft, Dealing in Stolen Property and False Ownership of a Pawn Item. He was arrested at the scene.

Sheriff Tommy Allen said that traffic on Highway 74 was disrupted for almost four hours by the accident, until shortly before 1 p.m. According to the Highway Patrol Sibley was traveling west

on Highway 74 when he drove his dump truck into the grass median, pulled back onto the highway, went back into the median, returned to the westbound lane of the highway, then overturned. The truck stopped on its side in the westbound lanes of the highway.

Sibley is being held in the Anson County Jail under a \$20,000 bond, awaiting extradition to Florida.

Summer Safety Reminder -Look Before You Lock!

The Anson County Partnership for Children and Safe Kids Anson County are issuing a reminder for all parents and child care providers to "Look Before You Lock" this summer, to prevent unnecessary child deaths related to heat exposure inside vehicles. So far in 2012, there have been 15 child deaths due to heat stroke after being left in unattended vehicles.

A recent study conducted by the American Academy of Pediatrics showed that in just one hour, vehicle temperatures can reach up to 117 degrees Fahrenheit even though it's only 72 degrees outside. That same study reported that cars with cracked windows can still result in temperatures rising 19 degrees in just 10 minutes.

In an effort to raise awareness, the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and Safe Kids USA have issued the following guidelines for all parents, child care providers, Head Start programs, and the general public: • Make it part of your everyday routine to account for all

children in your care; • Never leave a child unattended in a vehicle—even if the windows are partially open or the engine is running and the

air conditioning is on; · Always make a habit of looking in the vehicle—front and

back—before locking the door and walking away; • Set up backup systems to double check that no child is left

• Parents should ask their child care provider to call them if

their child does not show up for care as expected;

• Do things that serve as a reminder a child is in the vehicle, such as placing a purse or briefcase in the back seat to ensure no child is accidentally left in the vehicle, writing a note or using a stuffed animal placed in the driver's view to indicate a child is in the car seat.

· Remember, leaving a child alone in a vehicle, even for just 10 minutes, can cause heatstroke and death.

Anson County Fifth in NC in Visitor Spending Increase Percentage

Gov. Bev Perdue announced that all of the state's 100 counties saw increases in visitor spending in 2011, including seven counties that had double-digit increases. Data from the North Carolina Department of Commerce's Division of Tourism, Film and Sports Development showed that three counties (Mecklenburg, Wake and Guilford) had more than \$1 billion in visitor spending in 2011 while Dare, Buncombe, Forsyth and Durham all had more than half a billion in spending.

Domestic visitors to and within North Carolina spent a record \$18 billion in 2011, an increase of 8 percent from 2010. For the first time, state tax receipts as a result of visitor spending neared \$1 billion in 2011. Local tax revenues totaled nearly \$561 million. Visitor expenditures directly generated 187,900 jobs and more than \$4 billion in payroll income within North Carolina in 2011. 'Tourism means jobs - nearly 200,000 of them across North Carolina," said Gov. Bev

Perdue. "The depth of the state's appeal is reflected in the fact that every corner of North Carolina benefited from tourism. More than 37 million people experienced what makes this state such a desirable destination, from our wondrous coast and breathtaking mountains to our lively cities and fascinating towns.' The visitor spending figures come from an annual study commissioned by the Division of

Tourism and conducted by the U.S. Travel Association. The study uses sales and tax revenue data plus employment figures to determine the overall impact of visitor spending in North Carolina. Highlights include: Mecklenburg County received more than \$4.1 billion in domestic travelers' expenditures to

lead all of North Carolina's 100 counties. Wake County ranked second with \$1.7 billion, followed by Guilford County with nearly \$1.1 billion. • Chatham and Davidson counties had the largest percent increases in visitor spending from

2010 with increases of 10.8 percent each. Forsyth and Mecklenburg counties each saw visitor spending increase 10.5 percent, followed by Anson (10.3 percent), Alamance (10.3 percent) and Wake (10.2 percent). ullet Mecklenburg County directly employs the most tourism employees with more than 43,000

and has the largest total payroll (\$1.4 billion). Wake (19,180), Guilford (11,790) and Dare (11,260) each have more than 10,000 direct tourism employees.
