#### **GrowGreen Power Announces \$250** Million Project in Anson County, 300 Jobs

Boulder, Colorado-based GrowGreen Power announced on July 5 that a site has been chosen in Anson County for a \$250 million project. According to a press release downloaded from www.growgreenpower.com, the project will integrate a 50-acre greenhouse with a 37-megawatt cogeneration plant, where tomatoes will be grown for commercial sale.

"Our team has worked diligently to find a location that fits our needs," said Bradley Nixon, Principal and CEO of GrowGreen Power. "Not only does Anson County provide what we need regarding our distribution and business requirements, but it's also an area that will genuinely benefit from the job opportunities that our development will offer.' According to the press release, the project will mean over 300 permanent jobs for the county. The unique development provides communities with fresh foods and renewable energy by combining hydroponic greenhouses with a solar thermal/biomass power plant.



The announcement was good news for the county, which has registered double-digit employment numbers for 32 consecutive months -dating back to October 2008. The county's June jobless rate was 12.5%.

According to Nixon, GrowGreen Power is having ongoing, productive discussions with the North Carolina power companies regarding how the renewable energy it produces will enter the power grid. He added that GrowGreen Power has enjoyed a warm reception from North Carolina and Anson County's local leadership.

"We received a tremendous response when we first announced our intentions to come to North Carolina," Nixon said. "The support we've received from the community has been very positive and encouraging. We are excited to have our first project in North Carolina and we genuinely hope the folks here are just as excited to have us.

The hydroponic greenhouse is a fully controlled growing environment capable of producing up to 30 times more high quality, safe produce than traditional farming. Initially GrowGreen Anson County will produce tomatoes on the vine. US annual per capita use of tomatoes and tomato products has increased nearly 30 percent over the past 20 years according to the US Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Economic Research Service (ERS).

The GrowGreen center's solar thermal and biomass power plant produces 43.65 megawatts of clean, renewable energy, about 37 megawatts of which will be sold to the local power grid. The remaining energy will be used to power the greenhouse and power plant, making the GrowGreen center fully sustainable. The electricity produced will provide local power companies the option to purchase Renewable Energy Credits (RECs), allowing them to meet state mandates requiring more and more energy come from renewable sources.

The site will be located on US Highway 52 near the Jeff Cloud Airport

Items can also be entered into the "In Memoriam" and "Blast from the Past" categories. Items made by deceased loved ones can be entered in "In Memoriam" while items made prior to 2002 and never shown in a fair can be entered in "Blast from the Past."

Last year's county fair showcased 254 entries from 96 fair exhibitors. Participants received ribbons and were awarded a total of \$504 in premium money. This year promises to be attended just as well.

The County Fair is only one component of the annual Anson Ag Expo & Fair, slated this year to be held Friday and Saturday, September 23-24. Fair entries will be on display from 6 until 9 p.m. on the 23rd and again on the 24th from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. in the Ingram Room at SPCC. Mark your calendars now to enter items and then come out and see who the winners are.

#### Wadesboro Man Dies in Apartment Fire

On Saturday, August 6 during the early morning hours the Wadesboro Police and Fire Department were dispatched to an apartment fire at 309 West Short Plaza. When police officers arrived there was visible fire and heavy smoke coming from the apartment. The Wadesboro Fire Department arrived very shortly after. Once the fire was under control and firemen could make entry into the apartment they found Dennis James Thompson, 56, inside. Mr. Thompson was pronounced dead at the scene.

After a joint investigation from Wadesboro detectives and Wadesboro Fire Department officials the fire was determined to be accidental, originating from an electrical shortage. The cause of death to Mr. Thompson was smoke inhalation.

Police and fire officials urge everyone to please check their smoke detectors on a regular basis, and also have an evacuation plan ready in case of fire.
