Patients heard through a new use of technology

Interpreting via a tablet is helping deaf and hard of hearing patients, as well as non-English-speaking patients and their families communicate more easily with caregivers through virtual capabilities. The service, known as Video Remote Interpreting (VRI), allows caregivers to access medical interpreters who can communicate in real-time through videoconference. It's an app that can be securely accessed through a dedicated VRI device. The initiative was spearheaded by Carolinas HealthCare System's Language Services Department, part of Patient Experience.

The System's Language Services Department is well staffed with interpreters who speak Spanish and are available to assist patients with language barriers. The new virtual service is used for more immediate access to medical interpreters, allowing patients and caregivers to connect with an interpreter within seconds, rather than waiting for one to arrive at a facility.

'We believe that the new virtual remote interpreting capabilities are helping us bridge communication gaps between our patients and providers," said Denise White, chief nursing officer at Carolinas HealthCare System Union. "It's a great service that allows us to better meet the needs of our patients and families."

Through the new services, patients now have assistance from interpreters who speak American Sign Language, Spanish, Burmese, Arabic, Cantonese, Mandarin, Korean, Somali, Vietnamese, Russian and seven other languages. As of July 2015, the Carolinas HealthCare System facilities using the technology together logged over 100,000 minutes of the service.

Parents Urged to Discuss Financial Literacy with College Bound Kids Over the next couple of weeks, thousands of par-

ents will send their teenagers off to college. Before they leave, the Better Business Bureau urges parents to talk to their kids about money, credit and scams. "Young people are tech savvy, but not scam savvy," said BBB President Tom Bartholomy. "It's critical for college kids to understand that they are the target market for credit card offers and the decisions that they make now can affect their credit for the next seven years." BBB's top six money-related topics for parents to

1) Checking account: Many college kids will have a checking account with a debit card. Parents should dis-

cuss overdraft fees, keeping checks in a safe place, using secure internet connections to check balances, and liability if debit card is stolen. Credit cards: College kids are deluged with credit card offers and incentives to sign up on campus. Parents should discuss late payment and over limit fees, interest

rates, impact on their credit reports, liability if card is stolen, using a safe internet connection to check their

balance, email and text spoofing scams from 'bank' about problems with their card or account and shredding

documents with personal information. A small lockbox is a great way to secure personal documents. Credit report: College is the time when young people first begin establishing credit through a credit card or student loans. They can get a free credit report from each of the three credit bureaus each year at www.annualcreditreport.com. It's important for parents to check their kids' credit reports on a regular basis to insure that

no credit accounts have been opened in their name. 4) Identity theft: Identity thieves target young people because they have little to no credit which means they typically don't have credit blemishes. Plus, it takes young people longer to find out that they have been the victim of identity theft because they may not check their credit very often. Parents should warn their college bound kids about not giving out personal information, especially their social security number, banking or credit card numbers, birth date and home address.

5) Friendly fraud: Although there are high tech ways that someone can steal your identity, the most common way that young people become identity theft victims is through friendly fraud. Friendly fraud occurs with a roommate, family member or friend uses their debit card or credit card without their authorization or opens up new credit accounts in their name without their knowledge.

6) Requests from friends: Parents should make sure that their college bound kids know about the ramifications of co-signing loans or utility accounts for friends, lending money to friends, or letting a friend use their credit card or driver's license for a fake identification card.
