### Anson County's June Unemployment Rate was 5.1%

Anson County's unemployment rate for June was 5.1%. Statewide the unemployment rate was 4.2% in June.

Here are June unemployment rates in Anson County for each of the last seven years: 2010 13.4%; 2011 12.5%; 2012 12.5%; 2013 11.5%; 2014 7.4%; 2015 6.9% and 2016 5.8%

Anson's total labor force in June was 10,435. Of that number 9,906 were employed and 529 were unemployed. In May the total labor force was 10,577 with 10,026 employed and 551 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in 69 of North Carolina's counties in June, increased in four, and remained unchanged in 27. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 7.6 percent, while Buncombe County had the lowest at 3.2 percent.

Nine of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases and six remained unchanged. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount at 6.4 percent had the highest rate and Asheville had the lowest rate at 3.4 percent. The June

This is a release from Burnsville Recreation & Learning Center: Children 5 to 17 years old from Anson and surrounding areas enjoyed this summer's six weeks of Summer Fun Day Camp. The camp operated daily from 8:30 a.m. until 1 p.m. with an enrollment of 75+ children who attended at some point during the course of the camp. This was all made possible through the support of caring and concerned people.

Each day started with a hot nutritious breakfast at 9 a.m. along with inspiration. Lunch was provided daily at 12:00 noon. The campers were exposed to math and science workshops under the instruction of Professor Harlie Sturdivant of Greensboro. Also involved were weekly computer whiz instructor Mrs. Inez Williamson, Money Matters Class with Phyllis Dawkins and Tameka Harrington of BB&T of Wadesboro.

Mrs. Kay Ratliff and associates from the Anson Writer's Club gave the students an experience of writing a short story. There were two stories created, one with the younger students and the other with the older youth.

Hampton B. Allen Librarian Roxie Ingo provided reading enrichment weekly with arts and crafts activities after each session. The arts and crafts illustrated the stories that the children had read. All students were issued certificates for their accomplishments in reading from the library.

Sewing made simple was instructed by Mrs. H. Dunlap. All of the children who participated in this class made their own pillows from materials donated to the BRLC. Once the pillows were completed, campers carried the pillows home with them at the end of the program.

Lieutenant Williams and associates from the Anson County Sheriff's Office talked to the campers on the importance of crime prevention, and about not being fearful of the police, but building a close relationship with police force. The children were introduced to the drug sniffing dog, learning about his duties and how important his duties are to the force.

The North Carolina Forestry Service presented Smokey the Bear to the campers. The history of Smokey was shared with the campers. Their duties are important to the preventing of fires of all kinds.

The visit from Senator Tom McInnis was important to the campers. He discussed some of his duties as Senator of North Carolina for this rural district, as well as the importance of staying in school. The children had questions for Senator McInnis which he took time to answer. Senator McInnis also presented to BRLC a flag of the State of North Carolina. Volunteer David Cash hung and raised the flag on the flagpole outside of BRLC.

WSOC- TV Meteorologist John Ahrens visited the campers again this year. He talked to the campers concerning the eclipse that will soon take place. Mr. Ahrens encouraged the campers to prepare to view the eclipses. He also involved some campers to illustrate weather patterns. He shared how the weather pattern can be compared to the behavior of individuals.

Commissioner Bobby Sikes came and shared with the campers the importance of farming in this county. He discussed the pros and cons of farming. Many students had questions for him which was interesting.

not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.2 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased all 100 counties. All fifteen metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in June by 509 to 4,708,854, while those unemployed decreased 4,343 to 208,449. Since June 2016, the number of workers employed statewide increased 84,212, while those unemployed decreased 44,241.
