# **Back to School Safety Checklist**

This month, as nearly 1.5 million students return to classrooms across North Carolina, Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey, who also serves as Chair of Safe Kids N.C., is reminding everyone to keep safety in mind when walking, driving, or riding the bus to school.

"We all have an important role to play in keeping our children safe," said Causey "Drivers need to be on the lookout for crowded crosswalks and school buses on the road and parents need to talk to their children about the importance of traveling to school safely. It only takes one mistake to cause a tragic injury or death to a child.

While students in Anson County as well as students on traditional calendars in other counties will go back to school on August 28, students at year-round schools and some charter schools have already started boarding buses and have headed back to class.

Statistics highlight the need for a call to action. On a typical day, more than 14,000 school buses carrying nearly 800,000 students operate on North Carolina roads. According to DOT, there were 1,075 crashes involving school buses in 2022. A total of 786 people were injured and eight people died.

There were also 5,189 charges for speeding in a school zone and 968 charges for failure to stop for a stopped bus.

In addition to the safety concerns these charges carry, they also hold repercussions to motorists' auto insurance premiums. Passing a stopped school bus can result in the motorist adding four insurance points to their policy and potentially doubling their auto insurance premiums.

### When driving, if you see a school bus with lights flashing, slow down and prepare to stop.

 Yellow flashing lights indicate the bus is preparing to stop to load or unload children. Red flashing lights and extended stop arms indicate the bus has stopped and children

are getting on or off the bus.

For pedestrians:

 Walk on the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk and you must walk in the street or road, walk facing traffic.

· Before crossing the street, stop and look left, right and left again to see if cars are coming. Never dart out in front of a parked car.

• Parents: Practice walking to school with your child, crossing streets or crosswalks when available.

- Never walk while texting or talking on the phone.
- Do not walk while using headphones.
- For bike riders:
- Always wear a helmet that is fitted and secured properly.
- Children need to know the rules of the road: Ride single file on the right side of the road, come to a complete stop before crossing the street and walk the bike across.
- Watch for opening car doors and other hazards.
- Use hand signals when turning.
- Wear bright-colored clothing.
- For bus riders:
- Teach children the proper way to get on and off the bus. • Line up six feet away from the curb as the bus approaches.
- If seat belts are available, buckle up
- Wait for the bus to stop completely before standing.

• If you must cross the road, walk at least 10 feet in front of the bus. For motorists, in addition to obeying the stopped school bus law: Don't block crosswalks.

Yield to pedestrians in crosswalks and take extra precaution in school zones.

# **Unauthorized Hydrant Use**


The use of Anson County Water Department fire hydrants for obtaining water for agricultural or any other purpose without written consent of the Water Department


is a violation of state and federal law. Hydrants are for use by written-permitted users, water company or fire department personnel only.



**Drivers:** Drivers chosen by older adults will need to complete the GTVP application.

### **Transportation Voucher Details**

Who: Anson County residents age 60+ who cannot drive for themselves due to mental or physical disabilities, or have no transportation of their own.

Where: Get a ride to medical appointments, grocery stores, banks, shopping, hair salons, outpatient surgery, dental appointments, physical therapy, chemotherapy, social outings, emergencies, pharmacy, paying bills, post office and senior center.

How: Set up a transportation appointment by calling Grace Senior Center at 704-694-6616. The older adult and driver must meet at Grace Senior Center in person to apply for the voucher program. All details of the program will be discussed at the appointment.

**Cost:** During the application process the mileage reimbursement will be discussed.

## **Ready**, Set, Sweep: Fall Litter Sweep Starting Soon

#### Ready to make a difference and help us keep North Carolina litter free?

The N.C. Department of Transportation is seeking volunteers to pick up roadside litter during the 2023 Fall Litter Sweep, which is from Sept. 16-30. The Litter Sweep is one of NCDOT's roadside litter removal initiatives. Residents throughout the state are encouraged to participate in local efforts to help clean up North Carolina's roads. Traditionally scheduled for the last two weeks of April and September, Litter Sweep is the N.C. Department of Transportation's biannual statewide roadside litter removal initiative.

"North Carolina's beauty spans from the Blue Ridge Mountains to the Outer Banks and safeguarding its litter-free charm is a collective effort," said David Harris, the state's Roadside Environmental engineer. "By participating in the Fall Litter Sweep, you are helping to ensure a clean and green North Carolina that we can all take pride in."

During this two-week period, NCDOT's maintenance crews dedicate their time to clearing litter from our roadsides and collecting the orange bags placed on the roadsides that have been filled by volunteers.

Volunteers are provided cleanup supplies, such as reversible orange/blue trash bags, gloves and orange safety vests, from their local NCDOT County Maintenance Yard office.
