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July Unemployment Rate at 8%

Anson County's unemployment rate for July was 8 percent. In June the rate was 7.4 percent. Statewide the unemployment rate for July was 6.9%,

In July 2013 the unemployment rate in Anson County was 10.3%. In July 2012 it was 12.6%, in July 2011 it was 12.5%. Anson's total labor force in July was 10,632. Of that number 9,785 were employed and 847 were unemployed. In June the total labor force was 10,483, with 9,710 employed and 773 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) increased in 95 of North Carolina's counties in July, decreased in four, and remained unchanged in one. However, when compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 14 metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year.

Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 12.7 percent while Currituck County had the lowest at 3.9 percent. All fourteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases. Among the Metro areas, Rocky Mount at 10.2 percent experienced the highest rate and Asheville at 5.2 percent had the lowest. The July not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 6.9 percent.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) increased in July by 7,838 to 4,396,729, while those unemployed increased 21,502 to 324,277. Since July 2013, the number of workers employed statewide increased 48,186, while those unemployed decreased 75,846.

Fire Disaster Averted Thanks to Fire Safety Education

Wadesboro Fire Department's education program recognized as one of the top two in all of North Carolina

Wadesboro Fire Chief Marc Sessions and the Anson County School System teach fire safety to students, and that important information averted what could have been a catastrophe for one family recently.

On Thursday, August 21 two young men, Mekhi Brooks (11 years old) and Rondell Thompson (15 years old) were at home cooking breakfast. While cooking the pan flamed up and began to burn. The boys immediately turned the stove off, covered the pan with a lid, and called 911 for assistance. They evacuated the residence and were waiting at a meeting place the family had predetermined in the front yard. Thanks to their knowledge and actions the home suffered only minimal smoke damage. The boys' proud mother is Monica Brooks.

"Each of these young men told our firefighters that they had implemented the training they received at school through the Fire Department's education programs. Their actions prevented property loss and potential injuries to them," said Wadesboro Fire Chief Marc Sessions. "This is why the Wadesboro Fire Department puts an emphasis on its prevention efforts and continues to expand its programs. It demonstrates the commitment made by the volunteer firemen to keep their community safe. We want to prevent fires from occurring, but we know that we won't stop all of them. But when they do happen, we want all the stories to have a happy ending like this one."

In the past year the Wadesboro Fire Department's Fire and Life Safety Education Program was awarded recognition as the second best program in North Carolina (#1 went to Greensboro, population 277,080).

"Our real rewards are examples such as this one, when citizens use their knowledge from Wadesboro Fire Department's education program to protect themselves and their

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Pow Wow Event Scheduled for Weekend of September 12

Anson County will host our first Intertribal Indian Pow Wow at the Lemuel Community Center in Morven the weekend of September 12. This event will feature all kinds of Indian culture, including music, dancing, stories, education, arts and crafts, food, vendors and more.

The schedule is:

• Friday is Children's Day, from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

• On Saturday the gate will open at 10 a.m. and events will run until 5:30 p.m. The Grand Entry is at 12:30 p.m.

• On Sunday there will be worship service from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m., the gate will open at 11:30 a.m. and events will run until 5 p.m. The Grand Entry on Sunday will be held at 12:30 p.m.

What is the Grand Entry? The Pow Wow begins with the Grand Entry. All spectators are asked to rise as the flags and eagle staffs of the host and visiting tribes are brought in. The Eagle staffs and flags represent nations, families, and communities. As the drums begin a Grand Entry song, the chief or tribal chair of the host tribe and visiting dignitaries. including veterans from fire departments, police, the military and other services, enter the arena. They are followed by other honored members and the color guard of veterans Elected royalty (princesses, warriors, etc.), young people who have been chosen and honored by their specific home community to represent that community at Pow Wows around the country, follow next. Led by the elders, the men dancers follow next, generally in the following order: men's traditional dancers, men's grass dancers and then men's fancy dancers. Then the women enter, also led by the elder women and in the order of women's traditional dancers, jingle dress dancers and then fancy shawl dancers. The teenage boys enter next, followed by the teenage girls and then the younger boys, girls and tiny tots. The dancers in each category are announced by the MCs as they pass the announce stand. Finally the arena is filled with all of the dancers, each dancing in their grand regalia. Responsibility for maintaining the song passes from drum to drum, going around the circle until all dancers are in the center of the circle and dancing. With all remaining in the center of the circle, the prayer song and honoring song for veterans begin next. It is a spectacular sight filled with beauty and excitement and pride.

"The Pow Wow is a family cultural event," said Chief Jim Wilson of the Indian River Dwellers, the event organizer. "This is the first Pow Wow in Anson County, and we hope that it becomes a growing part of the community that will be held every year. We, as Native Americans, look at building programs such as this into events that are just as important 50 years from now as they are today." "We strive to offer programs that allow children and the public to better understand our Indian culture and way of life, and also to understand that we are not necessarily the Indians you see on television and in movies," Wilson concluded. The cost is \$5 for adults, children 5-18 get in for \$3, and seniors, veterans and children under 4 get in for free. The Lemuel Community Center is located at 206 Highway 145 South in Morven. Vendor space is still available. Also, the event depends on sponsorships to help cover expenses.
