Three More COVID-19 Deaths in **Anson County in the Last Week**

Vaccines are available. Ansonians urged to get vaccinated.

The latest information posted by the Anson County Health Department on Friday, September 3 showed 3,174 total Covid-19 cases, with 254 active. There were three additional deaths from Covid-19 last week, bringing the total deaths to 66. Last Monday, August 31 there were 3,085 total Covid-19 cases, with 214 active and 63 deaths.

Vaccines are available, including walk-in clinics. They are free, and all you have to do is call the Health Department at 704-694-5188 for more information.

Health Director Fred Thompson, PhD gave this update on September 2. "We continue to see an alarming increase in COVID-19 cases in the county caused by the Delta variant. Unfortunately, many of these are occurring in children. For example, today we have 37 new cases. Unfortunately, 14 of these 37 new cases are in children 17 and vounger.

Our unvaccinated adults are spreading the virus to our children. It is critical that if you are going to be indoors, and in close contact with unvaccinated children, you mask up – especially if you are unvaccinated. Please remember that children under the age of 12 are not yet eligible for vaccination. It is up to all of us as responsible adults to protect our children from the virus.

I again want to stress the importance of everyone 12 and older getting vaccinated. The numbers speak for themselves. The COVID-19 Attack Rate is 4.5x higher in unvaccinated individuals, and the Mortality Rate is 15x higher in unvaccinated individuals. We are vaccinating every Tuesday at the Health

Department and no appointment is needed. Just come over and we will get you vaccinated. Protect yourself. Protect our children. Please consider

The NC Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) reported that statewide as of Monday, September 6 there were 8,590 new cases, with 14,708 deaths and 3,800 hospitalized. 66% of adults in NC were vaccinated with at least one dose, 61% were fully vaccinated.

Anson County's Unemployment Rate Dropped a Bit in July

Anson County Anson County's unemployment rate for July was 5.9%. In June was 6.1%. In May it was 5.5%. In April it was 5.4%, 5.9% in March. In February the rate was 7.5%. The January rate was 7.7%, December was 7.1%. In November the rate was 7.2%. The October rate was 7.2%, the September rate was 8.5%, the August rate was 8%, the July rate was 10%, the June rate was 7.9%, May's rate was 10.1% and April's rate was 8.2%. In March 2020 the unemployment rate in Anson County was 4.9%, just before it was affected by the pandemic.

Statewide Statewide the unemployment rate for July was 4.6%. The June rate was 4.9%. The May rate was 4.5%, April rate was 4.4%. In March it was 4.6%. The February rate was 5.6%. In January and December 2020 the rates were 6%. Other 2020 rates: In November and October the rate was 6.1%. In September the rate was 7%. In August the rate was 6.8%. In July the unemployment rate

Anson's total labor force in July was 10,254. Of that number 9,650 were employed and 604 were unemployed In June the total labor force was 10,397, with 9,764 employed and 633 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased

in 99 of North Carolina's counties in July and remained unchanged in one. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 9.1 percent, while Avery County had the lowest at 3.5 percent. All fifteen of the state's metro areas experienced rate

decreases. Among the metro areas, Rocky Mount had the highest rate at 6.7 percent, while Durham-Chapel Hill and Raleigh each had the lowest at 3.9 percent. The July not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 4.6 percent. When compared to the same month last year, not

seasonally adjusted unemployment rates decreased in all 100 counties. All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases over the year. The number of workers employed statewide (not

seasonally adjusted) increased in July by 26,529 to 4,817,155, while those unemployed decreased by 15,020 to 232,409. Since July 2020, the number of workers employed statewide increased 300,560, while those unemployed decreased 228,345.

It is important to note that employment estimates are subject to large seasonal patterns; therefore, it is advisable to focus on over-the-year changes in the not seasonally adjusted estimates.

Former Wadesboro Fire Chief Marc Sessions Honored

Sessions and the Wadesboro Fire Department presented with SAVE Awards On Friday, September 3 North Carolina Insurance Commissioner

and State Fire Marsal Mike Causey traveled to Anson County to present grants and honor a retired fire chief whose efforts to install smoke alarms is credited with saving the lives of five people. Retired Wadesboro Fire Chief Marc Sessions and the Wadesboro

Fire Department were given SAVE Awards, which go to firefighters and first responders who go above and beyond the call of duty. On March 17 Wadesboro firefighters responded to a residential fire at an apartment.

One adult and four children, ages 2 to 6, escaped a fire that started when a pizza box was left on the stove and one of the children accidentally turned on a stove burner. The fire department determined that retired Chief Sessions, who was passionate about making sure homes had working smoke alarms, had himself installed the alarm that saved their lives.

Commissioner Causey also presented ceremonial grant checks totaling more than $\$250{,}000$ to 14 volunteer fire departments from Richmond and Anson counties. The money is part of a statewide matching grant program providing more than

\$9.8 million to 554 volunteer fire departments.
