That facility is now a reality, and it is called Gumbu's.

Gumby's will also be open to the public, both for those in need, and for anyone who has items or funds to donate The hours of operation will be announced soon. From Vancine Sturdivant: On March 20, 1954, I was born to a household that would consist of three adults,

Grandma Sarah Spencer Wall, my parents Jasper and Thelma Robinson, and seven brothers and sisters. We stayed in a four room home - not a house - a home, because it was full of love. Every room except the kitchen was a

Lets fast forward - We lived in what was then known as the Pee Dee Community of Lilesville, on Highway 145 The entire community was almost all widowers. No one had a driver's license, but were able to travel anywhere they wanted, especially to church.

As a teen I witnessed my grandmother and mother feed everyone in our community. The Lord took my grandmother home in 1984, and my mother continued feeding the elderly in our area. When the Lord took my mother home, l continued her legacy of feeding the elderly in our community, along with what my husband and I were already doing

since the early 1990's. It grew bigger and bigger. My husband would always say, "You need your own place." The name "Gumby"...Upon meeting my husband, William Lafayette Sturdivant Sr., his nickname was "Mr. Gumby" and my nickname was "Pookie." (From the cartoon on television.)

The sign on the new building says - Gumby's "We will Dance again." I met my husband in the early 1970's at a cookout and he asked me to dance. That man could dance! I love to dance and he did too. I remember going to Rockingham one night and our song came on the radio. We pulled beside the road and danced. Cars were blowing at us. Crazy, both of us were crazy!

Anyway, one of the things he said he was going to do upon his retirement was build me a building to house items for the homeless, elderly, schools and less fortunate. This is Gumby's. He was going to name it after me. I am not worthy. I named it after him. The building is located on Highway 74 in Lilesville. It consists of two desk areas, a full kitchen, bathroom, washer and dryer (to launder donated items) and plenty of space so I will be able to accept and distribute necessary items. The furniture was donated by Elissa Michelle Sturdivant and Carolinas HealthCare System Charlotte.

Before Gumby's, with charity items in bags and boxes, sometime I failed to remember what had been donated, and I would go purchase the items only to find out later I had it. Now with items on shelves or hanging up, I can inventory what I have. This will make the whole process more efficient.

We will be open to the public. There will be operating hours. Before I decide on the hours, I have to see how many true volunteers I will have, so at first visits will be by appointment. On Tuesdays and Thursdays I cook and feed the elderly and homeless. Now we are starting Toys for Tots. Certain days I do the reading program at Wadesboro Primary and Elementary Schools. And those kids need all of us to help.

Both donors and people in need will come here to Gumby's. If they do not have transportation we will go to them like we do now.

NC State Archives Will Visit Anson County on September 21

A one-day special exhibit of documents from the NC State Archives will be on display at the Lockhart-Taylor Center on Thursday, September 21, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The documents reflect North Carolina's revolutionary politics as the colonies increasingly resisted the British oversight and taxes. Among significant documents to be displayed is Josiah Martin's speech denouncing the Second Provincial congress, the General Assembly's response, an excerpt from a Surry County committee of safety journal, and a letter delivering news of America's newfound status as an independent state. Also included is a document signed by all three North Carolina delegates who, just over a month earlier, had signed the Declaration of Independence. On July 2, 1776, the Continental Congress voted that the American colonies were in-

dependent states. Two days later, on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was adopted. It was signed by William Hooper, Joseph Hewes, and John Penn, delegates from North Carolina and whose signatures you will see at this exhibit. This exhibit is being brought to the Lockhart-Taylor Center by the Anson County His-

torical Society, a project that has been in the works for over a year. These are documents that generally are in the vaults of the State Archives and seldom seen by the general public. With the help of State Sen. Tom McInnis, this event was coordinated with the State Archives and brought to Anson County for public display. "These documents capture the emotions of people who were beginning to recognize

their own power. The language reflects discontent with the status quo," commented State Archivist, Sarah Koonts. Ms. Koonts will also be the speaker at the Wadesboro Rotary Club meeting at noon on that Thursday. Other archivists will be available to talk about and describe the documents.
