As part of Child Passenger Safety Week, Safe Kids Anson County, in collaboration with Anson County Partnership for Children and the Anson County Sheriff's Office, urges parents and caregivers to have their children's car seats checked at one of the scheduled event locations. Certified child passenger safety technicians will be available to inspect car seats and provide free hands-on advice on the following dates:

"The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) recently released updated car seat recommendations for children through age 12," said Ashlie Jones, Safe Kids Anson County Coordinator. "We want to help you do all you can to best protect your child when traveling. During Child Passenger Safety Week, we urge all parents and caregivers to have your car seat checked by a certified technician. When it comes to the safety of your child, there is no room for mistakes."

In motor vehicle crashes, car seats reduce the risk of fatal injury by 71 percent for children younger than 1 and by 54 percent for children 1 to 4 in passenger cars, according to data collected by NHTSA. In 2009 alone, 754 children 12 or younger were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes while riding in passenger cars or light trucks. And among those who were fatally injured where restraint use was known, 42 percent were unrestrained. Many of these tragedies could have been prevented if the children were in the right restraint for their age and size.

Producers must meet specific eligibility requirements to receive SURE assistance for disasters that occur on or before September 30, and affect fall 2011 and 2012 crops. "The SURE program compensates Anson County producers for production and quality losses during times of disaster," said Yaklin.

Anson County Producers can apply for a 2011 or 2012 SURE payment if a crop of economic significance in a primary or contiguous disaster county under a Secretarial Disaster Designation suffered at least a 10 percent loss because of a disaster occurring on or before September 30.

Crops are not required to be harvested on or before September 30 to maintain SURE eligibility. A loss claim will only trigger after FSA determines that the loss was from a disaster occurring on or before September 30. Losses resulting from disasters occurring after September 30 will not be eligible for SURE benefits.

Producers with 2011 and 2012 crop losses caused by disasters occurring on or before September 30 must meet the following criteria:

• For insured crops, the insurance policy defines the coverage period as beginning on or before September 30.

For Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) crops, the coverage period begins on or before September 30.
The final planting date according to RMA and FSA (NAP crops only) occur on or before September 30.

Yaklin warns, "If the crop is planted prior to September 30, but the final planting date is after September 30, the crop will not be eligible for SURE benefits."

The sign-up period for 2011 and 2012 SURE will not begin until after the national average market prices are determined for each respective crop year, which is normally one year after the applicable crop year. Tortoise & Hair 5K Run/Walk to Honor Sam Lanning



In a letter from Gwen Lanning: Alopecia areata? What is this? That's exactly what my husband Hoy and I asked when the dermatologist told us that's what our son had, when we took him in with a bald spot on his head. Our youngest child Sam was 5 years old at the time of being diagnosed with this disease called alopecia areata. For weeks after his diagnoses we agonized about how to explain the complexities of alopecia areata to our little boy: What is this autoimmune condition? How did he get this? What triggered his little body to reject the hair on his head all of a sudden? Why did this happen to him? And will his hair grow back? There are many questions but very few answers. Thankfully, the condition is not terminal, but there is no cure at this time. The only certainty about alopecia areata is the unpredictable nature of the condition. Sam is 12 years old now and has 98% of his hair, although it comes and goes.

And, we don't know how long he will keep it. As Sam's parents he expected us to fix it and make his hair grow back. Isn't that what parents are supposed to do, fix everything? Believe me we would have done anything to help our little boy.

Living in a society where so much attention is focused on physical appearance, it may be emotionally challenging to live without hair. Hair may only be cosmetic, but we as a society spend so much time and money - getting hair cut, colored and styled. It is doubtful that many people would willingly choose to go through their lives without hair. People could be cruel in their comments about Sam's appearance, and when he was taunted by other children Hoy and I wished we could protect him. But, when you are different and you stand out among the crowd you will get noticed.

Sam had just turned 5 when we noticed his first bald spot. It was smaller than the size of a nickel. Watching Sam lose his entire head of hair, in a mere two months, was heartbreaking to say the least, and the feeling of helplessness was paralyzing at times. That is the reason why we are sharing our experience. First, we hope to inform you of this little known condition that affects at least 4.7 million people (about 2 percent of the population) in the United States, and many more people around the world. Alopecia areata affects people of all races, genders and ages, although the occurrence is greater in people under thirty.

We had never heard of the words, "alopecia areata" or known anyone with the condition prior to this experience. It is our hope that you will share this information with friends and family so that more people can become aware. Second, I hope you will join my family in raising awareness for the National Alopecia Areata Foundation (NAAF), a nonprofit organization founded in Mill Valley, California in 1981. NAAF awards grants for research to find causes and a cure for alopecia areata, it educates the public, and it supports those with the condition. Through NAAF we were able to meet other individuals affected by this condition who are living life to the fullest and defining their own sense of beauty.

If you would like to help, please consider signing up for the 2nd Annual Tortoise & Hair 5K Run/Walk in uptown Wadesboro on Saturday October 8th at 8 a.m. There is also a fun run for children 12 and under at 7:30 a.m. The 5K is in conjunction with Wadesboro's Annual People Fest street festival, in its 28th year.
