Little was elected Mayor, and elected council members were Bob Cagle, Howard Teal, Pickett Stanback, Frank Tucker and some fellow named Ed McBride. We were elected to serve the people of Wadesboro for the next two years.

After being sworn into office Mayor Little made his appointments - and sometime later, after discussions, he appointed me to the task of designing a suitable "Town of Wadesboro" seal.

Some days later my drawing was presented, discussed meanings, etc. - voted on, and passed. Next was a time of negotiations for someone to print it, without changes, additions, deletions or colors...but, as designed, with the "opportunity ribbon."

- Six stars: 3 on each side represent Mayor and five
- · Cardinal and dogwood tree: North Carolina, especially Anson County
 - Established 1783
- North Carolina
- "Opportunity" for all!
