Demetri Montraze Little Escapes Jail, Captured in 3 Hours

With only two weeks to go on his original sentence, Little now likely faces six month extension to his jail term

An inmate worker at the Anson County Jail ran from the jail Sunday afternoon, September 14 while helping jail staff in the jail's sally port (garage). Sheriff Tommy Allen said the inmate, identified as Demetri Montraze Little, 19, serving 30 days for a probation violation, was assigned to a work detail when he ran under the sally port's door as it was being closed. Jail staff chased the inmate down toward Highway 74 where they lost sight of him. They found his shoes near the intersection. A K-9 later tracked the inmate to a nearby convenience store where officers believed he was picked up.

Deputies gave out a description of the inmate along with a description of his girlfriend and her car. She had just visited the inmate that afternoon. The car was stopped about 5:30 p.m. that afternoon by Monroe Police near Hilltop in Monroe. Little was in the vehicle, and he was arrested along with his girlfriend, Alena Jo Moore, 18 of Peachland. Moore was charged with Harboring an Escaped Prisoner and Conspiracy and Accessory After the Fact of Escape. Little was charged with Felony Escape;

Conspiracy and Resisting an Officer. Bonds for both subjects were set at \$1,000,000.

Little had less than two weeks to go on his sentence. His escape attempt will add approximately six additional months to his jail term.

Sheriff Allen said that the jail uses inmates in certain work areas. "We don't have the staff to do everything inside the jail. Certain inmates are used to work inside and on occasions outside the secure jail area. These inmate workers are usually low risk inmates serving short sentences in the jail. Little had been an inmate worker for about two weeks, had not given any problems and had been following the rules," Allen said. "This is the first time we've had something like this to happen. We are reviewing our policies to see if we need to make some changes. The jail staff did what they were supposed to do. No one did anything wrong. The inmate was back in custody within three hours."
