Armed Robbery Suspects Flushed Out Thanks to GPS Ankle Monitor

Crime Doesn’t Pay - Especially When Your Getaway Plan Involves Plumbing

On Wednesday, September 10, Wadesboro Police responded to Oak Hill Apartments after two men reported being robbed at gunpoint. The suspects fled with two firearms and what police described as \$40 in cash - a money haul unlikely to impress even the most frugal of criminals.

Cpl. Yarbrough and Officer Tupper, with backup from Cpl. Sikes and Officer Ivy, got to work right away. Their job was made easier thanks to suspect Jadon Carelock, who was already wearing a GPS ankle monitor as a condition of probation. In a move that will no doubt be remembered at future crime prevention seminars, officers were able to track his every step in real time.

Carelock later tried to destroy the ankle monitor by cutting it off and tossing it into a toilet. Unfortunately for him, toilets don’t erase GPS data, and plumbing is rarely an accomplice. Officers soon found Carelock and his alleged partners, Jamare Leak and Jahiem Leak, hiding out at Myrtlewood Apartments - without the knowledge or consent of the actual resident.

Police recovered the stolen guns, along with an extra unreported firearm. The individuals were charged as follows:

- **Jadon Carelock** (DOB: 08/05/1997): Robbery with a Dangerous Weapon, Larceny of a Firearm, Possession of a Firearm by a Felon, Possession of a Stolen Firearm, Felony Breaking and Entering. No bond at time of arrest.
- **Jamare Leak** (DOB: 12/02/2004): Possession of a Firearm by a Felon, Possession of a Stolen Firearm, Felony Breaking and Entering. \$20,000 bond.
- **Jahiem Leak** (DOB: 11/13/2006): Possession of a Stolen Firearm, Felony Breaking and Entering. \$10,000 bond.

The case wrapped up almost as fast as it began, thanks to quick police work and the fact that criminals still haven’t figured out that ankle monitors are basically crime’s worst accessory. Unsolicited advice: If you’re going to commit armed robbery for \$40, maybe rethink your career choices.

Wadesboro Police Chief Thedis Spencer said, “This case was swiftly resolved thanks to the dedicated efforts of our officers and the collaboration with Anson County Probation and Parole. We remain committed to keeping our community safe and holding those who commit violent crimes accountable.”

17% Increase In Adult Learners at South Piedmont

South Piedmont Community College’s Adult Education program is growing rapidly, with more than 2,100 learners served during Program Year 2024–2025 - a 17 percent increase over last year and 53 percent growth since 2022–2023.

Adult learners are turning to South Piedmont to earn a high school diploma or equivalency, learn English, strengthen literacy skills, or gain digital proficiency. “The numbers are impressive, no doubt, but what matters most are the stories behind them,” said Associate Vice President Kelly Stegall. “Every student who completes an Adult Education program is better prepared to provide for their family, achieve success, and reach goals they once thought out of reach.”

South Piedmont offers five core programs to meet community needs:

- **High School Equivalency and Adult High School** – preparing adults to earn a diploma or equivalency credential.
- **English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)** – improving English skills and providing pathways to further education and careers.
- **Compass Education** – supporting adults with disabilities as they transition into employment or post-secondary education.
- **Digital Literacy** – teaching computer skills for employment, education & personal growth.

The program’s success is fueled by strong community demand, practical skills training, and partnerships with organizations such as Union and Anson County Transportation and local health and human services agencies.

Adult Education at South Piedmont reflects the diversity of the region. More than half of participants were employed while enrolled, balancing education with work and family. Fifty-two percent were between the ages of 25 and 44, and nearly half entered without a high school credential.

“As Adult Education continues to grow, we remain focused on creating accessible pathways that help students become more employable and increase their economic mobility,” Stegall said.

Governor Stein Announces Standing Orders to Increase Access to COVID-19 Vaccines

Governor Josh Stein has directed State Health Director Dr. Larry Greenblatt to issue a Standing Order allowing easier access to COVID-19 vaccines for adults. The Order will align with the FDA’s Aug. 27, 2025, approval indicating the COVID-19 vaccine for:

- All people 65 years of age and older.
- Individuals 18 and older who have at least one high-risk condition. This is a broad list that includes high-risk conditions such as obesity, asthma, diabetes, physical inactivity, depression, former or current smoking, and pregnancy, among many other conditions.
- If you think you may be eligible, you can view the list of risk factors for severe COVID-19 infection on the CDC’s website, cdc.gov/covid/risk-factors.

The move is intended to reduce barriers and expand access as North Carolina enters cold and flu season. Vaccination against COVID-19, flu, and RSV remains especially important for those at higher risk of severe illness.

The FDA approved the 2025–2026 COVID-19 vaccine in late August. With the Standing Order, pharmacists across North Carolina can now administer the updated vaccine directly to eligible adults. Children ages six months to 17 years should continue to receive vaccines through pediatricians or other health care providers.

According to NCDHHS, more than 70% of COVID-19 vaccines in the state were administered at pharmacies last year. Most major chains and many independent pharmacies now have the updated vaccine available. Residents are encouraged to call ahead to confirm availability and make an appointment.

The Standing Order brings North Carolina in line with most states that allow pharmacy-based access to COVID-19 vaccines without requiring a doctor’s prescription.

Crisis Ministries Provides Free Food Tuesday - Friday

Anson Crisis Ministries distributes free food items to over 1,000 families each month. This adds up to an estimated 50,000 people a year in Anson and surrounding counties. They serve families Tuesday through Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.
