Covid Update for Anson County

According to the latest information posted by the Anson County Health Department on Wednesday, September 14 the total Covid cases in Anson County were 7,774, with 61 active and 99 deaths. On September 7 the county was at 7,701 total Covid-19 cases, with 94 active cases.

If you are positive or currently awaiting test results, please stay home.

A new COVID Testing site has been set up in Morven at the Church of God Prophecy (8447 US Hwy 52 South). Currently they are only administering PCR tests and are open Monday-Friday (9am-4pm).

You can still stop by the health department and pick up test kits to keep at home. If you aren't feeling well you can send someone and they will send some to you.

The Health Department still offers Moderna vaccine on Thursdays (Walk-In). They hope to be offering the new (Fall) Bivalent Booster Vaccines within the next few weeks. They will make an announcement when those are received and available.

The Health Department is also offering N-95 masks. For more specific information related to Anson County

Nickels for Know-How Referendum

The Anson County Nickels for Know-How Referendum will be held on Thursday, November 17, 2022. County Extension Director Roshunda Terry said one polling place has been established in the county. It is the County Extension Office, located at 501 McLaurin Street, Wadesboro, NC 28170.

Roshunda explained that the referendum is being held to let users and producers of feed or fertilizer decide if they wish to continue the self-assessment program. This program has been in place since 1948, and the law requires that a new referendum be held every six years.

A 2/3s favorable vote will mean that growers are willing to continue to assess themselves to support agricultura research and education. The assessment is fifteen cents per hundred pounds on feed and fertilizer produced in North Carolina.

The funds, about \$1.4 million annually, are collected by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and then allocated by the NC Carolina Agricultural Foundation, Inc.'s 148 volunteer Board of Directors to support agricultural research and extension projects at North Carolina State University benefitting agriculture in North Carolina.

North Carolina's August **Employment Figures Released**

The state's seasonally adjusted August 2022 unemployment rate was 3.5 percent, increasing 0.1 of a percentage point from July's revised rate. The national rate increased 0.2 of a percentage point to 3.7 percent.

North Carolina's unemployment rate decreased 1.3 percentage points from a year ago. The number of people employed increased 1,375 over the month to 4,944,797 and increased 198,133 over the year. The number of people unemployed increased 7,904 over the month to 179,561 and decreased 57,547 over the year.

Seasonally adjusted Total Nonfarm employment, as gathered through the monthly establishment survey, 10,100 to 4,801,300 in August. Majo industries experiencing increases were Leisure & Hospitality Services, 3,800; Professional & Business Services, 3,000; Education & Health Services, 2,300; Manufacturing, 2,100; Information, 1,700; Construction, 1,200; Financial Activities, 1,100; Other Services, 200; and Mining & Logging, 100. Major industries experiencing decreases were Government, 4,900; and Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 500. 174,700 and Government increasing by 900. Major industries experiencing increases were Professional & Business Services, 49,700; Leisure & Hospitality Services, 36,700; Education & Health Services, 22,700; Trade, Transportation & Utilities, 18,700; Manufacturing, 14,500; Financial Activities, 11,300; Construction, 8,200; Other Services, 6,900; Information, 6,100; and Government, 900. The only major industry experiencing a decrease over the year was Mining & Logging, 100.
