Four Charged with Attempted Murder

Four men, Devon Smith, 16, Shiheem Robinson, 17, Brandon Hough, 26, and Joseph Liles, 21, have been arrested and charged with Attempted First Degree Murder by the Wadesboro Police Department. The victim, John Edward Kirby of 405 Threadgill Street in Wadesboro, sustained injuries about the head and is receiving medical treatment at CMC-Charlotte.

According to a release from the Wadesboro Police Department, officers were dispatched to Kirby's house on Tuesday, September 18 at 2 p.m. in response to a robbery call. Upon their arrival at the scene, officers found that Kirby had been robbed and assaulted with an unknown object. Because of his extensive injuries Kirby was flown by helicopter to CMC-Charlotte. As a result of their investigation WPD Officers arrested Smith, Robinson, Hough and Liles.

The four men were charged with Attempted First Degree Murder, Robbery with a Dangerous Weapon, and Conspiracy to Commit Robbery with a Dangerous Weapon. All four are in the Anson County Jail. Smith and Robinson were placed under \$400,000 bonds, Liles is under a \$225,000 bond, and Hough is under a \$200,000 bond. Their court date is set for October 9.

Operation Medicine Drop is Saturday

An opportunity to safely dispose of old medicines

The Anson County Sheriff's Office in partnership with Anson County Safe Kids and the Wadesboro Police Department will hold its fifth "Operation Medicine Drop" this Saturday, September 29th, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Anson Station Shopping Center, next to Food Lion. The purpose of this program is to encourage individuals to turn in their old medicines that are no longer needed or out of date and provide a safe and secure method for disposing of them.

The Sheriff's Office conducted its first Operation Medicine Drop in 2010. Since then, over 30,000 doses of pills, capsules, morphine patches, opiate based medicines, syringes and needles, as well as liquid medicines and inhalers have been turned in. Anson County Sheriff Tommy Allen said that this is an easy and safe way for citizens to properly dispose of old, out-of-date or no longer needed medicines. "What we are doing is to give our citizens a chance to clean out their medicine cabinets, bring the old medicines in, no questions asked and we will see that it is properly disposed," Allen said. "Health officials say flushing or putting them in our trash ends up in landfills or ground water. Neither are acceptable ways to dispose of unused medications."

According to the NC Attorney General's Office, more young people are abusing prescription medications than any other drug except marijuana. In 2011, deaths from prescription medicines surpassed those from all other of the illegal drugs combined. In the past ten years, 75% of all unintentional poisonings (both adult and children) were caused by prescription or over-the-counter medications.

This operation is being held in conjunction with the US Department of Justice and DEA's "National Take Back Initia-All forms of medicines, including animal or pet tive." medications, will be accepted and properly disposed.
