

- Stage material into racks as needed. Maintain a safe and clean work area at all times.
- Assemble and load material onto assigned truck.
- 1) Build and assemble product by customer using load sheets, and load and scan product onto

Extension Notes

Food Safety After a Disaster

September is National Preparedness Month. This year's theme "Be Disaster Aware, Take Action to Prepare" is being used in a national campaign to encourage

the public to act now in case disaster strikes. Although locally we have seen a quiet hurricane season, September is usually the peak month for storms. With the national campaign happening as well, it is a good

time to remember a few ideas about food safety during and after a storm. After a power failure, you might not have heat, refrigeration or water. To prepare food when you have no power, follow these guidelines. If you have limited heat for cooking, choose foods that cook quickly. Prepare casseroles and one-dish meals, or serve no-cook foods.

If you cannot use your stove, you can use a fireplace or candle warmer, such as a

fondue pot. Do not use a candle warmer to cook raw meats, fish, poultry, and eggs. You can also use a camp stove and charcoal burner. Never use a fuel-burning camp stove or charcoal burner inside your home, even in

a fireplace. Fumes from these stoves can be deadly. Do not cook frozen foods because they require much more cooking time and heat than canned goods.

Eat commercially canned foods straight from the can. Do not eat home canned meats and vegetables unless you can boil them for 10 minutes before eating. Substitute liquids from canned vegetables for water in unsweetened cooked dishes. Substitute juice from canned fruits for water in salads and beverages. All water

from questionable sources that will be used in food preparation must be boiled for at least 10 minutes before use. If you are without refrigeration, open only enough cans or jars of food for one meal. Leftover food in jars and cans cannot be saved. If necessary, sub-

stitute canned and powdered milk for fresh milk. Prepare and eat foods in their original containers, if possible. With the door closed, food in most freezers will stay below $40^{\circ}F$ for up to 3 days, even in summer. Thawing rate depends on the amount of food in the freezer, the kind of food, the temperature of the food, the freezer and the size of freezer. You may safely re-freeze foods that still contain ice crystals or that

have been kept at 40°F or below. More information on disaster preparation and recovery can be obtained from the NC Cooperative Extension Service at ncdisaster.com.

New NC Poll Finds Major Support for Early Childhood Education

Bipartisan support for expanding Smart Start and NC Pre-K. Anson County program has strong support. A new bipartisan North Carolina poll finds that North Carolina voters view early

childhood education as a critical issue in the state and across the nation. Majorities of Democrats, Republicans and Independents support investments in early childhood programs in the state – including expanding access to Smart Start, Pre-K, teacher training and home visiting programs. More than four in five (83%) of North Carolina voters believe that investments in early childhood programs will benefit North Carolina's economy in the short and long

term. Voters ranked ensuring children get a strong start as a top priority for policymakers, second only to jobs and the economy and well ahead of reducing the tax burden on families. The poll was conducted by the bipartisan team of Public Opinion Strategies and Hart Research for the First Five Years Fund and the North Carolina Early Childhood Foundation Voters are very concerned that children get a strong start in school and see high

quality early childhood education as the answer. Three-quarters of state voters support expanding access to the NC Pre-K and Smart Start programs so that more children in the state can benefit from them. In addition, 88 percent want North Carolina to invest in training and classroom resources so that all pre-school and early elementary school teachers are able to teach each child in a way that addresses their individual needs and ensures they have a strong start in reading and school.

As the funding agent for Anson County's Smart Start and North Carolina Pre-Kindergarten Program, the Anson County Partnership for Children is charged with ensuring that Anson County children get a strong start in school. Executive Director Elaine B. Scarborough says she is not surprised by the results the bipartisan North Carolina poll. "Citizens and businesses in Anson County are strong supporters of the work of the Anson County Partnership for Children on behalf of young children in our community. They understand the link between strong early childhood education and success in school and in the workforce. I'm sure our citizens support expanding access to early childhood programs in Anson County in order to better prepare our children to succeed in school."

Nearly three-quarters of North Carolina voters (71 percent) support greater federal investment in early childhood education if it increased the deficit in the short term but paid for itself in the long term by improving children's education, health and economic situations. Earlier this year, a national poll commissioned by The First Five Years Fund found that 71 percent of voters - including 60 percent of Republicans - support greater federal investments in early childhood education.

"North Carolina voters truly understand that when each child is given the best opportunity to succeed—to realize their potential and contribute as productive citizens-North Carolina prospers," said NCECF Founding Executive Director Susan Perry-Manning. "Our state has a proud history of innovation and investment when it comes to early learning, and we know more needs to be done. Increased state and federal investments will mean more children can benefit from high-quality early learning programs, which in turn creates better education, health and economic outcomes for everyone in North Carolina."
