### Anson County Awarded \$448,134 Community Development Grant

Anson County has been awarded an NC Catalyst Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) of \$448,134. This was one of 21 such grants awarded to counties and communities throughout the state. The grants are used to upgrade various transportation, housing, economic development and public neighborhood projects.

Anson County's grant will be used for several projects:

Repairs and improvements at Grace Senior CenterTo demolish and clear dilapidated houses that have been

abandoned in Morven and Wadesboro • Emergency repairs to various houses

Materials for three Habitat for Humanity houses

Minor repairs at Anson Crisis Ministry

County Manager Lawrence Gatewood praised the exceptional work by Anson County Community Development and Grants Administrator Mary Beck. "Mary is the person responsible for the county receiving this grant. Because of her expertise, experience and skill in grant writing, and the effort she has put into this grant the entire county has benefitted."

"These projects revitalize our communities and improve the lives of so many North Carolinians," said Governor Perdue. "We're proud of our local governments and their efforts to strengthen all aspects of their communities, and for the federal government's assistance in doing that."

Rep. Frank McGuirt said, "I certainly echo the Governor's words. When counties and towns step forward to revitalize our communities we all benefit."

Gatewood concluded by saying, "This grant will help Anson County become a better place to live, grow and enjoy, for all its citizens."

The NC Catalyst grant funds are provided through a federal interagency partnership between the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the Department of Transportation (DOT). Catalyst funds are dedicated for projects serving persons of low and moderate incomes.

## Unemployment Up to 13.1% in August

During August Anson County had more citizens employed than during July, 9,755 versus 9,686, but the unemployment rate percentage went up because of an increase in the labor force total, from 11,084 in July to 11,231 in August. Anson County's unemployment rate in August rose to 13.1% from July's 12.6% rate.

Looking back at August 2011, the rate then for Anson County was 12.5%.

Anson's total labor force in August was 11,231. Of that number 9,755 were employed and 1,476 were unemployed. In July the total labor force was 11,084, with 9,686 employed and 1,398 unemployed.

Statewide the unemployment rate for August was 9.7%, July's rate was 9.8%. Unemployment rates decreased in 72 of North Carolina's 100 counties in August, increased in 18 and were unchanged in 10. When compared to the same month last year, unemployment rates declined in 92 counties, increased in six, and remained the same in two.

North Carolina had 39 counties that were at or below the state's not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 9.7 percent. Unemployment rates decreased in 13 of the state's 14 Metropolitan Statistical Areas. The rate increased in the Fayetteville Metropolitan Statistical Area.

Statewide the number of workers employed (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in August by 29,377 to 4,219,378, while those unemployed fell 12,777 to 451,806. Since August 2011, the number of workers unemployed decreased 51,092, while those employed increased 52,752.

while those employed increased 52,752. Currituck County had the state's lowest unemployment rate in August at 4.7 percent, and Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 17.2 percent.

## Wadesboro Fire Department Urges Residents to "Have Two Ways Out!"

#### During Fire Prevention Week, October 7 - 13

If you woke up to a fire in your home, how much time do you think you would have to get to safety? According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), one-third of Americans households who made and estimate they thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life threatening. Unfortunately, the time available is often less.

That's why the Wadesboro Fire Department is teaming up with NFPA during Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13, 2012, to urge residents to "Have Two Ways Out!" This year's theme focuses on the importance of fire escape planning and practice.

In 2010, US fire departments responded to 369,500 home structure fires. These

fires caused 13,350 civilian injuries, 2,640 civilian deaths, and 6.9 billion in direct damage.

"One home structure fire was reported every 85 seconds in 2010," says Marc Sessions of the Wadesboro Fire Department. "Fire is unpredictable and moves faster than most people realize. Having a tried and true escape plan with two ways is essential to ensuring your family's safety should fire break out in your home."

The Wadesboro Fire Department recommends the following tips for planning your family's escape:

• Make a map of your home. Mark a door and a window that can be used to get out of every room.

• Choose a meeting place outside in front of your home. This is where everyone can meet once they've escaped. Draw a picture of your outside meeting place on your escape plan.

• Write the emergency telephone number for the fire department on your escape plan.

• Have a grown-up sound the smoke alarm and practice your



escape plan with everyone living in your home.

• Keep your escape plan on the refrigerator and remind grown-ups to have your family practice the plan twice a year or whenever anyone in your home celebrates a birthday.

The Wadesboro Fire Department will be hosting activities during Fire Prevention Week to promote "Have Two Ways Out!" Through these educational, family-oriented activities, residents can learn more about the importance of fire escape planning and practice, as well as the power of prevention. ## Six Arrested in Anson and Union County Burglary Ring

Detectives with the Union County Sheriff's Office have arrested six men they say were involved in a burglary theft ring in Anson and Union Counties. The New Salem and northeastern areas of Union County had seen a spike in the number of break-ins from April through August. Detectives soon began to notice similarities in the crimes, and used a number of methods to get the word out for citizens to be watchful.

After fliers were handed out and local churches began to put the information in mailing lists and social media sites, tips began to come in. At the same time, detectives from Anson County were investigating similar crimes in the towns of Peachland and Polkton, and soon it became obvious to them that these crimes were all linked, deputies said. Soon, firearms and other stolen property were recovered, and detectives began interviewing potential suspects.

All those arrested have a first court appearance on November 5.
