
The event will conclude that evening at 5:30 p.m. with a free gospel concert featuring many local groups and talents from Anson and the surrounding regions.

Veterans Affairs Program to Provide Free Flu Shot, Health Care Registration Information and More on October 25

The W.G. (Bill) Hefner VA Medical Center's rural health team will provide free flu shots to eligible Veterans on Thursday, October 25, from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. This will take place at the Anson County Veterans Services Office, located in the former Belk building at 111 North Greene Street in Wadesboro. Shots will be available for all veterans currently using VA Health Care and to those veterans possessing a DD-214 and a valid photo ID.

All former and current military members are encouraged to attend. VA staff will also provide health care registration, education and information services to all non-registered veterans and assist in completing enrollment applications, requesting DD Form 214s, and initiating MyHealtheVet online services.

Former military members who are not currently enrolled for VA health care benefits will need to bring a copy of their DD Form 214 to attach to their application for VA health care benefits. Veterans who cannot locate their DD Form 214 can request a copy from www.archives.gov/veterans/military-service-records.

The Anson County Sheriff's Office, the State Bureau of Investigation and the Polkton Police are investigating the stabbing death of an inmate at a local prison that occurred on Friday, September 28th. Officers were called to Lanesboro Correction Institute in Polkton at 12:18 p.m. on Friday. Lanesboro is a high security state prison with 1,000 beds for high risk inmates, opened in 2004. It is located adjacent to Brown Creek Correctional Institution and Anson Correctional Center. Officers found one inmate who was deceased, Wesley Eugene Turner, 35, and one inmate who had been stabbed.

There had been an altercation between several inmates. Investigators, who are working with the Department of Public Safety Division of Adult Corrections officers, (formerly called the Department of Corrections) identified several inmates in the assault.

The pod where the incident happened has about 140 inmates, but not all were involved," said Lanesboro Correctional's administrator Lawrence Parsons. "When the fight broke out prison guards worked quickly to separate the inmates. No guards were injured or threatened." Hours after the incident the prison remained on lockdown, with inmates confined to their assigned cells.

Authorities have recovered what they believe was the weapon used in the fight, which they described only as some type of metal. But they said they don't yet know how it was obtained.

Sheriff Tommy Allen said that even though the prison houses many high-risk inmates, including gang members, they didn't have information to suggest that the fight was gang related.

Turner, imprisoned since 1996 on multiple offenses including second degree murder, had been housed at Lanesboro Correctional since April 2009, and was set to be released in 2017. He had 43 infractions against him during his time behind bars, including one for fighting in August.

Authorities are not releasing the name of the injured inmate because of security reasons, said Pamela Walker, a state public safety spokeswoman. He was taken to CMC-Charlotte for treatment. Officials released few other details on the fight, saving they're still investigating what prompted the altercation and how many people were involved. It has not been determined who, if anyone, might face charges in Turner's death.

Sheriff Allen said that his officers are working with the SBI and other agencies as the investigation continues.

Turner was convicted in the shooting death of a 23 year old Goldsboro man in 1995. In 1999 he and two other men were shot by guards as they attempted to escape a prison farm along the Roanoke River. Turner and another prisoner were wounded, but the third escapee, who was convicted of raping and stabbing a Raleigh school teacher, was shot dead. In 2003, Turner was charged with two counts of assault on an officer. His list of 43 prison infractions shows he was accused of as-
