649 Reported Cases of COVID-19 in Anson County as of October 5

Two more deaths reported by the Health Department

As of Monday, October 5 the Anson County Health Department posted that Anson County had 649 reported cases of COVID-19. 69 of those cases were active. At that point they had discharged 580 cases, 574 to baseline health and six deaths.

In a release on Tuesday, September 29 the Health Department stated, "Unfortunately, we have to report two more deaths today that are related to COVID-19. Our thoughts are with those families who have lost loved ones. Our total number of deaths is now at six.

The NC Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) reported statewide as of Monday, October 5 there were 219,754 total cases of COVID-19, with 3,637 deaths. 3,188,371 completed tests and 971 currently hospitalized.

Governor Cooper Moves North Carolina to Phase 3 on October 2 With Stable Numbers

Safety precautions set for large outdoor and some indoor venues

North Carolina will ease cautiously some restrictions while continuing safety measures to combat the spread of COVID-19 as the state's metrics remained stable in September, Governor Roy Cooper announced on September 30.

Our top priority remains getting children back to in-person learning. This month marks a major shift for many families now and in the coming months as schools open their doors, some for the first time since the pandemic," said Governor Cooper. "The virus continues to spread, so we must take the next steps methodically, and responsibly.

We must continue our hard work to slow the spread of this virus," said Secretary Mandy K. Cohen, M.D. "By practicing the 3Ws — wear, wait and wash, — getting your flu shot, and downloading the SlowCOVIDNC app, each of us can protect the progress we have made.

Dr. Cohen reviewed the state's key metrics:

• Trajectory in COVID-Like Illness (CLI) Surveillance Over 14 Days North

Carolina's syndromic surveillance trend for COVID-like illness has a slight increase. • Trajectory of Confirmed Cases Over 14 Days North Carolina's trajectory of

lab-confirmed cases is level.

• Trajectory in Percent of Tests Returning Positive Over 14 Days North Carolina's trajectory in percent of tests returning positive is level.

• Trajectory in Hospitalizations Over 14 Days North Carolina's trajectory of hospitalizations is level.

In addition to these metrics, the state continues building capacity to adequately respond to an increase in virus spread in testing, tracing and prevention.

No-cost testing events are being deployed across the state and testing turnaround times are improving. New contact tracers are bolstering the efforts of local health departments. A new NCDHHS app, SlowCOVIDNC, is notifying users of exposure to the virus. Personal protective equipment (PPE) supplies are stable.

As these metrics and capacity remain stable, the state will ease some restrictions starting Friday. Executive Order 169 begins Oct. 2 at 5 p.m. and continues for three weeks through October 23. Its new provisions include:

Large outdoor venues with seating greater than 10,000 may operate with 7% occupancy for spectators.

 Smaller outdoor entertainment venues, like arenas or amphitheaters, may operate outdoors at 30% of outdoor capacity, or 100 guests, whichever is less.

Movie theaters and conference centers may open indoor spaces to 30% of capacity, or 100 guests, whichever is less.

• Bars may operate outdoors at 30% of outdoor capacity, or 100 guests, whichever is less.

- Amusement parks may open at 30% occupancy, outdoor attractions only.
- The limits on mass gatherings will remain at 25 people indoors and 50 people outdoors • The 11 pm curfew on alcohol sales for in-person consumption in locations such as
- estaurants and outdoor bars will be extended to October 23.

State and public health officials will continue watching the key COVID-19 trends over the next several weeks to determine if any further restrictions can be eased when the current Executive Order expires October 23.

North Carolina's annual campaign to support college access is during the month of October and is named NC Countdown to College. Activities during the month support high school seniors in completing three important college enrollment steps: 1) residency, 2) FAFSA, and 3) applications.

What is traditionally called College Application Week has been extended to two weeks this year: October 19 - 30. During these weeks, many NC colleges and universities waive their application fees.

Anson County's Unemployment Rate Dropped to 8% in August

Anson County's unemployment rate for August was 8%. That was down from July's 10% rate. The June rate was 7.9%, May's rate was 10.1% and April's rate was 8.2%. In March the unemployment rate in Anson County was 4.9%. Statewide the unemployment rate was 6.8% in August, down from July's 8.9% rate

In August 2019 the unemployment rate in Anson County was 4.9%, and statewide the rate was 4.3%.

Anson's total labor force in August was 10,473. Of that number 9,638 were employed and 835 were unemployed. In July the total labor force was 10,565, with 9,509 employed and 1,056 unemployed.

Unemployment rates (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in all 100 of North Carolina's counties in August. Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 11.6 percent, while Camden and Watauga Counties each had the lowest at 4.6 percent.

All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate decreases. Among the metro areas, Fayetteville and Rocky Mount each had the highest rate at 9.1 percent and New Bern had the lowest at 5.9 percent. The August not seasonally adjusted statewide rate was 6.8 percent.

When compared to the same month last year, not seasonally adjusted unemployment rates increased in all 100 counties. All 15 of the state's metro areas experienced rate increases.

The number of workers employed statewide (not seasonally adjusted) decreased in August by 22,848 to 4,485,131, while those unemployed decreased by 108,798 to 327,976. Since August 2019, the number of workers employed statewide decreased 379,491, while those unemployed increased 117,769.

NC Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey reminds Medicare beneficiaries to compare and evaluate their current plans and make necessary changes during the annual Open Enrollment Period, Oct. 15 – Dec. 7, 2020. Medicare plans and prices change. It is important for Medicare beneficiaries to take advantage of the Open Enrollment Period by contacting local Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program (SHIIP) counselors to save money, improve coverage or both.

The Open Enrollment Period begins Oct. 15 and runs for eight weeks to give consumers enough time to review and make changes to their Medicare coverage. Changes must be made by Dec. 7, 2020 to guarantee coverage will begin without interruption Jan. 1, 2021.

It's important to contact local SHIIP counselors before making a decision about coverage because beneficiaries may be able to receive more affordable and better Medicare health and/or drug plan options. For example, even if they are satisfied with their current Medicare Advantage or Part D plan, there may be another plan in their area that covers health care and/or drugs at a better price.

SHIIP is a division of the North Carolina Department of Insurance and offers free, unbiased information about Medicare, Medicare prescription drug coverage, Medicare Advantage, long-term care insurance and other health insurance issues. In addition to helping Medicare beneficiaries compare and enroll in plans during the Open Enrollment Period, SHIIP counselors can help people discover if they are eligible for Medicare cost savings programs.

Here are some of the ways to review and compare plans available for 2021:
