DMV Expands Online Driver License Renewals

Skip the line - keep the license - embrace the couch

In a move to further streamline services and reduce wait times at driver license offices statewide, the N.C. Division of Motor Vehicles (NCDMV) announced that eligible drivers without a REAL ID can now renew their driver license online for a second consecutive time. This change, effective immediately, stems from Senate Bill 245, signed into law last week by Gov. Josh Stein.

"We encourage our customers to renew their driver license online if they're eligible. It's fast, easy, and helps reduce wait times at our offices," said DMV Commissioner Paul Tine. "By choosing online services, you're freeing up space for those who need in-person assistance." Translation: click a few buttons - rescue a neighbor from a long line.

For now, the change applies to non-REAL ID driver licenses only and not State ID cards.

The law also allows REAL ID driver licenses to be

renewed online a second consecutive time if the customer has had an in-person transaction with a new photo taken since the last renewal. In many cases, that face-to-face visit was to get a REAL ID outside the normal renewal period, but it can also include name changes, in-state address changes, or duplicates. NCDMV expects these additional renewals to be available in the next several weeks - so yes, your most recent DMV selfie may finally pay dividends. One more upgrade is on the way: the law will allow

teen drivers to move from a Level 2 Limited Provisional License ("before 9s") to a Level 3 Full Provisional License ("after 9s") online, also in the next several weeks. (Teens can already upgrade from Level 3 Full Provisional

to a regular Class C license online on their 18th birthday because nothing says "adulthood" like renewing something on the internet.) When combined, these three provisions could shift up to 400,000 more transactions online instead of in person - which is great news for anyone who prefers the glow of

a screen to the glow of a take-a-number display. Ready to renew without leaving your favorite chair? Visit ncdot.gov/dmv. Monroe, NC 28110.
