Health Department Advises Everyone to Get a Flu Shot

Flu season usually starts in October and continues through the winter months with peak activity in January and February. Influenza, commonly called "the flu," is caused by the influenza virus, which infects the respiratory tract (nose, throat, lungs). Unlike many other viral respiratory infections, such as the common cold, the flu can cause severe illness and life-threatening complications in many people. Vaccination is the best way to prevent influenza.

Every year, flu spreads across the country, from per-

son to person, family to family, and community to community. The severity of flu illness can vary from mild to severe. When severe, flu complications can lead to hospitalization and sometimes even death. Even healthy children and adults can get very sick from the flu. Each year in the United States (on average) an estimated 5-20 percent of the population will be infected with the flu, and more than $200,\!000$ people may be hospitalized during a single flu season. An annual flu vaccination is the best way to prevent flu

and the flu-related complications that could lead to hospitalization and even death. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends vaccination before December to ensure that protective antibodies are in your system before flu activity is typically at its highest. The CDC and the Anson County Health Department recommends that everyone 6 months and older get a flu vaccine. The Anson County Health Department has Flu shots (in-

fluenza vaccine) for the 2016-2017 season available now. Flu shots are available by appointment Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Flu shots are free for uninsured children 18 years old and younger, or uninsured pregnant women. The cost for adults is \$35 for regular dose, and \$80 for high dose. Most major insurances, including Medicaid and Medicare, are accepted. The pneumonia vaccine is also available at the Health Department for adults 65+ years old for \$70.

Landowner Workshop Connects with Local Ag and Forestry Agencies

Heir forest landowners and farmers networked with local, state, and federal agriculture agencies last week when Anson Cooperative Extension and NC A&T University hosted a forestry field day and agriculture workshop at Centenary AME Zion Church in Lilesville on Tuesday, September 13.

"When descendants suddenly find themselves managers of heir property it can be a real struggle to oversee ag or forestland if new owners were not part of the decision-making process or past management of the property," began Aimee Colf, Horticulture Agent with Anson Cooperative Extension. "Your first step in understanding how to manage the land is knowing what agencies or outside professionals to contact for technical assistance.' Thirty participants from Anson, Richmond and Union counties attended the event which targeted beginning farmers,

heir landowners, minority, veteran and other traditionally underserved audiences in an effort to help landowners network with local natural resource agencies so they can afford to keep their land in the family, put it in production, or gain assistance with a forest management or conservation plan. The workshop was sponsored by the 1890 Center of Excellence Grant Program for Innovative and Sustainable Small Farms, Ranches, and Landowners through NC A&T University. Participants were greeted by special guests, Rep. Mark Brody, Senator Tom McInnis, and Anson County Commis-

sioner Vancine Sturdivant. A forestry field trip was led by County Ranger Gary McClendon, Service Forester Scotty Comer and landowner John McCormick. The afternoon session included information about Cooperative Extension (Dr. Joshua Idassi, Aimee Colf and Dustin Adcock), Natural Resources Conservation Service (Shauntae Britt and Tom Ward), Brown Creek Soil and Water Conservation District (Jake Barbee), Anson Tax Office (Larry Newton), NC A&T University Local Farm and Food Program (Laura Lauffer) and Farm Service Agency (Jennifer Almond).
