Election Information: All 2016 Primaries to One Date

On October 1 Governor Pat McCrory signed house bill 373 that moved all 2016 primaries to one date. March 15, 2016 will be the Primary Date for North Carolina elections, which includes Anson County.

Filing for offices for the primary will be held from Tuesday, December 1, 2015 at 12 p.m. through Monday, December 21, 2015 at 12 p.m. A candidate is eligible to file a notice of candidacy for a partisan primary only if that candidate has been affiliated with that political party for 75 days or more.

Director of the Anson County Board of Elections Steve Adams said, "This information is for those who have changed, or may change, parties and want to file for an office. Again, there will not be a May primary election. All primaries will be held on March 15, 2016.

Flu Vaccination Now Available at the Anson County Health Department

The 2015-2016 flu season is upon us and you may be undecided about whether to get the flu shot. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends vaccination before the month of December to ensure that protective antibodies are in your system before flu activity is typically at its highest. The CDC continues to encourage vaccination throughout the flu season, which may begin as early as October and last through May. While the CDC's Advisory Committee on immunizations

Practices (ACIP) recommends everyone over the age of 6 months should get the flu vaccine each season. It is especially important for the following high risk groups: Pregnant Women
Children younger than
but espe-

- cially children younger than 2 years old
- People 50 years of age and older People of any age with certain chronic medical conditions
- People who live in nursing homes and other long-
- term care facilities People who live with or care for those at high risk for
- complications from flu, including: Health Care workers
 Household contacts of persons at
- high risk for complications from the flu
- Household contacts and out of home caregivers of children less than 6 months of age.

The Anson County Health Department is now offering Flu Shots (Influenza vaccine) for the 2015-2016 seasons. Flu Shots will be available for walk-in patients Monday through Thursday, from 9 to 11 a.m. and then from 2p.m. to 4 p.m. The health department accepts the following Primary Insurance for the influenza vaccination: Medicare, Medicaid, Medcost, Aetna, Cigna, Blue Cross Blue Shield, and United Health Care.

Children without insurance coverage ages 6 months thru 18 years of age may receive a free influenza vaccination. Please bring in all insurance cards for verification of primary insurance coverage. Costs for individuals without active primary insurance

coverage are: • Influenza \$35 • High Dose Influenza \$80 • Pneumonia \$70

Medicare Annual Election Period Runs Oct. 15 to Dec. 7

Medicare Advantage, long-term care insurance and other health insurance issues In addition to helping Medicare beneficiaries compare and enroll in plans during the Annual Election Period, SHIIP counselors can help people find out if they are eligible for Medicare cost savings programs. Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives North Carolina Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal Wayne

Goodwin launched 2015 Fire Prevention Week last week by urging everyone to uphold this year's campaign theme, 'Hear the Beep Where You Sleep: Every Bedroom Needs a Working Smoke Alarm!' "About half of home fire deaths occur in the late night and early morning hours, when most people are asleep in bed," said Goodwin. "That's why it's so important for every

family member to be able to hear a smoke alarm from where they sleep." The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reported, that between 2009 and 2013, an average 940 deaths per year occurred in homes with no smoke alarms, while

an additional 510 occurred in homes with smoke alarms that failed to operate. This accounts for 59 percent of all home fire deaths. Follow these smoke alarm safety tips: Install smoke alarms inside every bedroom and outside each sleeping area.

Have smoke alarms in every level of your home, including the basement. Larger

- homes may need more alarms. • Install interconnected smoke alarms. When one alarm sounds, they all sound. Choose
- smoke alarms that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Never paint smoke alarms. Paint, stickers or other decorations could keep the alarms from working.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to make sure it's working
- Never disconnect or take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.
- ullet Smoke alarms with non-replaceable batteries should last 10 years. If the alarm chirps
- replace it with a new alarm.
- For smoke alarms with any other type of battery, replace the battery once a year. If the

alarm chirps, replace the battery right away.

Families can attend the Office of State Fire Marshal's "Family Fire Safety Shows" each day of the North Carolina State Fair (Oct. 15-25) where they will see fun, educational shows performed by fire department personnel from around the state.
