Apply Now for Summer 2016 Paid State Government Internships

North Carolina residents attending a college, university, technical institute or community college have until December 18, 2015 to apply for one of up to 70 paid state government internships available for summer 2016. All internships will begin on May 24, 2016 and conclude on July 29, 2016. The 2016 State Government Internship Project Booklet describing all available rules and opportunities is now online at www.doa.state.nc.us (click on "Press Releases.

The McCrory Administration's State Government Internship Program, through the Youth Advocacy and Involvement Office in the NC Department of Administration, offers students real-world experience in a wide range of state government workplaces. Internships provide opportunities for students to work in their chosen field and to consider careers in public service. More than $4{,}000$ students have participated since the program was established in 1969.

"The opportunities that this paid internship will give students will open doors throughout state government to afford students with an array of professional experiences in their field of study," said Candace Dudley, Internship Coordinator for the Youth Advocacy and Involvement Office. "This program will also assist state agencies with meeting their missions.'

with compensated professional work experience that integrates education, career development and public service. Opportunities exist in numerous recognized fields of study, from accounting to zoology, and interns will also participate in seminars, tours or other activities designed to broaden their perspective of public service and state government. Interns will earn a stipend of \$8.25 per hour and work 40 hours

per week for 10 weeks in the summer.

To be eligible for the program, a student must be a permanent North Carolina resident with an overall grade point average of 2.5 or better on a 4.0 scale, have graduated from high school and subsequently completed their sophomore year of college before beginning the internship. Community college students must complete their first year before beginning the internship. Applicants must be continuing their education in the fall following their participation in the program. To qualify for a position designated for law interns, a student must have completed at least one year of law school before the beginning of the internship. Students having previously held paid internships at the Youth Advocacy and Involvement Office are not eligible to apply.

Interns are selected through a competitive process overseen by the NC Internship Council. Selection is based on a review of applications by the Council, student interviews with prospective supervisors, academic records, participation in extracurricular activities and interest in state government.
