

Noted Advocate for Peace to Speak in Wadesboro

If you are unsure of the reasons behind the conflict in the Middle East, or wonder what you, as a private citizen, can do to achieve peace, plan to attend Sam Wazan's lecture at 3 p.m. on Sunday, October 26 at First United Methodist Church in Wadesboro. The lecture is free and open to the public. Wazan is a survivor of the 15-year combat in Lebanon and a passionate

catalyst for peace. In his talk he will:

Equip you with a new lens through which you can see religious violence. Present a rhetoric-free overview of the root causes of violence.

 Present ways and means to achieve peace from the grassroots up. "Wazan has an authentic experience in the inhumane effects of conflicts. In his Key Note speech: Ending Religious Violence: The Journey to Peace, he reflects on his first year of war, when his best friend in fifth grade got killed. He grew up surrounded by remorseless sniper fire, indiscriminate rocket attacks, and vicious religious massacres. He escaped a kidnap attempt, lived under a ninety-day siege, and took shelter alternating between the stairways and a garage depot, depending on the intensity of battles. (www.samwazan.com)

Risking his life to apply for a visa to the United States, Wazan now lives in Charlotte where he works as a senior management consultant. He is a Global Trustee at United Religions Initiative, chair of the Charlotte Cooperation Circle, member of the Immigration Task Force of the City of Charlotte, and member of the Comparative Religion committee at Temple Beth El.

Following his talk, Wazan will be available to sign copies of his best-selling novel, Trapped in Four Square Miles.

Kaye Ratliff and Sandy Bruney invited Wazan to come to Anson County after hearing him speak at a book festival in Lumberton last February.

The fact that he endured so much and transformed his experience into advocating for peace was amazing to us," Bruney said. "And the fact that we were able to raise the funds for his lecture fee from so many different sources - churches, businesses, and organizations - proves that peace is important to all of us, no matter what our religion or ethnicity happens to be.'
