Candlelight Vigil for Domestic Violence Awareness is Thursday

This is a release from the Anson County Domestic Violence Coalition: October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. According to the NCADV website, Domestic Violence Awareness month was first observed in 1987. Anson County Domestic Violence and Rape Crisis Center (ACDVC) participates in the Silent Witness program during the month of October to mourn those who have died because of domestic violence, celebrating those who have survived, and connecting those who work to end violence.

During October, life-sized wooden figures will be placed in the county, each one bearing the name of a person who once lived, worked, had friends, family - whose life ended violently at the hands of a partner, spouse, ex-spouse or acquaintance.

Domestic Violence often goes unreported. In Anson County from July 2016 to June 2017, ACDVC assisted 373 victims of domestic violence; 314 were female and 59 were males. The age bracket with the highest incident is 26-40 years old. According to statistics, one in three women and one in four men have been victims of some form of physical violence by their intimate partner. According to the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, every nine seconds a woman is assaulted. From October 1, 2016 to September 30, 2017 there were 72 domestic violence related deaths in North Carolina alone. 72!!!

On Thursday, October 26 at 6 p.m., a candlelight vigil will be held at the front steps of the Anson County Courthouse. ACDVC invites anyone who has a friend or loved one represented here or if you have been or know someone that has been affected by domestic violence to come and join us during this special time of remembrance.

• Protects your surroundings. Safe recycling of outdated electronics promotes sound management of toxic chemicals such as lead and mercury.


• Helps others. Donating your used electronics benefits your community by passing on ready-to-use or refurbished equipment to those who need it.
