### Five Tips to Keep Your Kids Safe this Halloween Season

Costumes, candy and treats, oh my! Halloween is a funfilled time for kids and parents alike. But did you know that on average, children are more than twice as likely to be hit by a car and killed on Halloween as on any other day of the year? Holly Stegall, MD, family medicine physician at Carolinas Primary Care, part of Carolinas HealthCare System Anson shares five safety tips to help make this year's festivities fun and safe for all the trick-or-treaters in your family.

 Make costumes safe. It's important to make sure your child's costume fits appropriately so they don't trip and fall. Children should wear well-fitting masks that allow for adequate vision, as masks that don't fit or have small eye holes pose a risk for kids tripping down steps and not seeing traffic.

2) Be visible. It's a good idea to have children wear lightcolored costumes and decorate their costumes and candy bags with reflective material to help make them more visible at night and easily noticeable to drivers.

3) Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Don't allow children to enter neighbors' homes that you don't know or trust. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult, and children 12 and younger should always be accompanied by an adult when out trick-ortreating. If driving from home to home, please be careful and be mindful of any fellow trick-or-treaters that may be walking. Inspect all candy and treats. Make sure to inspect all candy and treats before eating, and examine for any potential choking hazards. Though rare, parents should look closely to see if any wrappers have been opened or tampered with. Throw away any candy that is unwrapped, has a torn wrapper, or spoiled. It's also a good idea to avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers. 5) Walk safely. Always walk on sidewalks or well-lit paths whenever possible, and remember to look both ways before crossing the street. To avoid injuries, make sure to walk and not run from house to house. And don't forget to bring a flashlight with you while out trick-or-treating! "And most importantly, be sure to have fun and don't eat too much candy," says Dr. Stegall. # College Application Week Is Nov. 2 - 6
