



ACA Health Insurance Rates Released for 2026

Commissioner Causey urges North Carolinians to compare options early

North Carolina Insurance Commissioner Mike Causey has announced the approved health insurance rates for the 2026 Affordable Care Act (ACA) plans. For individuals with ACA coverage, the average rate will increase by nearly 28.6 percent in 2026. Individual policy rate changes will range from 16.88 percent to 36.4 percent, while small group policies will rise between 12.66 percent and 17.5 percent.

Open enrollment for 2026 ACA policies runs from November 1, 2025, through January 15, 2026. Those who enroll by December 15, 2025, will have coverage beginning January 1, 2026. Enrollments completed after December 15 will take effect February 1, 2026.

"I ask people purchasing ACA health insurance to go to healthcare.gov and find which plan works best for you," Commissioner Causey said. "Increased costs in healthcare as well as the expiration of federal subsidies result in premiums going up for many on the individual market. It's more important than ever to begin researching your health insurance options early.

In addition to ACA Marketplace plans, Commissioner Causey encourages North Carolinians to consider other coverage options:

• Job-based coverage: If your employer offers health benefits, you may qualify to enroll through your workplace, even if you declined coverage in the past. You may also be eligible through your spouse's employer or, if under age 26, through your parents' employer.

• Private insurance: Individuals may purchase coverage through an agent, broker, or directly from an insurance company. Some private plans may cost less than ACA plans but should be reviewed carefully to ensure adequate coverage.

• Student health plans: Those under 30 and enrolled in college or university may qualify for a student health plan. Contact your school for more information.

'Whatever you do, it is important to you and everyone to maintain health insurance," Causev said.

NCDMV Launches Online Upgrade for Teen Drivers from Level 2 to Level 3

Finally, something teens can do online that parents actually approve of

The North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles (NCDMV) has rolled out a new online option that lets eligible teen drivers upgrade from a Level 2 Limited Provisional License to a Level 3 Full Provisional License - all without the agony of waiting in line at the DMV. Thanks to this digital miracle, parents can now sip coffee in peace instead of spending an afternoon watching the "Now Serving" numbers creep by at a glacial pace.

Under the new process, teens who have held their Level 2 license for at least six months with no moving violations can skip the office visit and complete everything online. It's a simple two-step process: first, a parent or guardian logs in to the NCDMV's payment portal, enters their information, and gives consent. Then the teen $\underline{\text{gets}}$ an email notification — yes, the same inbox that's usually filled with memes and TikTok updates — and completes the upgrade. A temporary driving certificate is issued instantly, good until the shiny new Level 3 license arrives in the mail.

"Parents and teen drivers no longer have to take time off work or school for a simple upgrade. It's now available at their fingertips online," said NCDMV Commissioner Paul Tine. "This builds on our recent online renewal expansions enabled by Senate Bill 245 and keeps us moving toward becoming an exceptional customer service organization."

The move follows NCDMV's October launches of online renewals for non-REAL ID and REAL ID licenses, which racked up over 32,000 transactions in just four weeks — proof that people really will go to the DMV if they don't have to actually

Coming soon: consecutive online renewals for state ID cards, the final piece of Senate Bill 245, signed into law by Governor Josh Stein on September 30. Altogether, these upgrades are expected to allow 400,000 more transactions each year without anyone needing to pack snacks for the DMV line.

Note: At age 18, teen drivers can level up again — to a regular Class C license - all online, with zero waiting room boredom and no clipboards required.

Eastview Cemetery Welcomes Donations, Volunteers

Eastview Cemetery on Old Lilesville Road in Wadesboro is looking better these days - thanks to some new energy, fresh paint, and a few good-hearted volunteers who aren't afraid of a little ghostly company.
