Cafeteria Worker Busted for Mobile Meth Lab at Anson High School

Deanna Hatley, a 42 year old cafeteria worker at Anson High School, was arrested Monday, November 5 for having an active meth lab in her car while it was parked in the school parking lot during school hours.

Deanna Hatley Wadesboro Police received information that a vehicle was parked at the school that might possibly contain a controlled substance. Officers arrived at approximately 3 p.m. and located substances that

are consistent with the manufacturing of controlled substances in Hatley's vehicle. "There was a small, active meth lab in the vehicle at the time," said Major Thedis Spencer.

The vehicle was removed and secured away from the campus. With the assistance of the NC State Bureau of Investigation and the Anson County Sheriff's Office, Hatley was arrested on the charges of Possession of Methamphetamine Precursor, Possession of Precursor Chemical with the Intent to Manufacture a Controlled Substance on School Property, Manufacture Schedule II Controlled Substance, Maintaining a Vehicle for Keeping a Controlled Substance and Simple Possession of Schedule IV (Xanax).

Dr. Greg Firn, Superintendent of Schools said, "Police and authorities were notified and all safety/health precautions were taken to ensure the safety and well-being of all persons on campus. The Wadesboro Police department is to be thanked, as well as all officials who responded. To the best of our knowledge, no students or staff were in any immediate danger. Nonetheless, all precautions are being taken."

Firn concluded, "This incident had nothing to do with the students or teachers at Anson High School. Also, the incident did not occur inside of Anson High School."

Hatley was placed in the Anson County Jail under a \$20,000 bond. Her first court appearance is scheduled for November 26.

Thieves Destroy 16 Air Conditioner Units at Anson Schools Central Office

The theft delayed Saturday's early voting

On Saturday, November 3 at about 4:30 a.m., during a regular patrol of Anson County School's Central Offices at 320 Camden Road in Wadesboro, an officer from the Wadesboro Police Department noticed several damaged air conditioning units. Upon further investigation it was found that 16 air conditioning units had been vandalized by thieves. The units were stripped of their compressors and copper parts and wiring.

Damages have been estimated to be \$180,000 to \$200,000, according to Major Thedis Spencer of the Wadesboro Police Department. Spencer said he had never seen such a large copper theft from one location. He also said he believes the thieves are not amateurs because of how quickly and efficiently they worked. "They knew how to cut wires without getting electrocuted, and remove copper tubing full of Freon, which can be poisonous if inhaled," Spencer said. "I'm pretty sure there was more than one person doing this. I think it's a crew. They have to have the machinery, tools, and the know-how. The value of the copper was only a fraction of the damage done."

Damage done to the internet lines by the thieves also caused about an hour delay in Saturday's early voting, which was taking place at the school. Interim Director of Elections Steve Adams said he arrived Saturday morning to set up the polls and was surprised to find police and destroyed a/c units. "I was taken aback," he said. While 30 or 40 voters waited patiently, Adams worked with elections board members to arrange for the polls to stay open later, until 5 p.m., to make up for the lost time in the morning. Voting commenced about 9:45 a.m.

Dr. Greg Firn, Superintendent of Anson County Schools said, "We are outraged and extremely disappointed that thieves would take advantage of our taxpayers, because that's literally what they have done for as little as a few thousand dollars of copper...but at an expense of over \$180,000 for us to repair and replace. The same type of thievery has taken place in our churches, and these thieves obviously knew what they were doing. They had probably done surveillance." Firn concluded by saying, "Thanks to Mr. Jim Kiser of ACS

As of press time no arrests had been made.

Unemployment Rate in Anson Drops from 13% to 11.8% in September

Anson County saw a significant increase in employment during the month of September, with 9,883 employed versus 9,755 in August. The resulting unemployment rate for September was 11.8%. In August the rate was 13%.

Looking back at September 2011, the rate then for Anson County was 11.9%, so not much has changed during this time.

Anson's total labor force in September was 11,207. Of that number 9,883 were employed and 1,324 were unemployed. In August the total labor force was 11,231, with 9,755 employed and 1,476 unemployed.

Unemployment rates decreased in 97 of North Carolina's 100 counties in September, increased in one, and were unchanged in two. When compared to the same month last year, unemployment rates declined in all 100 counties.

North Carolina had 36 counties that were at or below the state's not seasonally adjusted unemployment rate of 8.9 percent. Unemployment rates decreased in all 14 of the state's Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

Statewide the number of workers employed (not seasonally adjusted) increased in September by 72,188 to 4,291,292, while those unemployed fell 31,303 to 421,149. Since September 2011, the number of workers unemployed decreased 62,424, while those employed increased 103,546.

Currituck County had the state's lowest unemployment rate in September at 5.1 percent, and Scotland County had the highest unemployment rate at 16.1 percent.
