Wife Charged with Murder in May 20 Incident

Sheriff's Deputies have arrested the wife of a murder victim and charged her in her husband's death. Sheriff Tommy Allen said that detectives from his office, along with the SBI, have been investigating the stabbing death of Ralph Eugene Blakney, age 54, since May 20. On that date Mr. Blakney was found in his wrecked pickup truck that had been involved in an accident on highway 742 South of Wadesboro, near Anson Memorial Park. It was determined that Blakney died from a single stab wound to the abdomen area. He had no injuries from the accident.

On Thursday, November 13, Sheriff's detectives arrested the victim's wife, Savino Jones Blakney, age 47, of 128 Shannon Drive in Rockingham. She was charged with Second Degree Murder in the death of her husband, and placed in the Anson County Jail under a \$250,000 bond.

Sheriff Allen would not comment as to what the motive of the crime was. "I believe that after being stabbed, Mr. Blakney was trying to drive himself to the Anson County Hospital when he apparently lost consciousness and wrecked his vehicle," the Sheriff said. "We have recovered the murder weapon; we have other physical evidence we just received back from the SBI lab; and we have a solid time frame of the incident. At that time, the Blakneys lived just a few minutes away from the accident scene. We charged Second Degree Murder based on our meeting with the DA."

Allen said that Mrs. Blakney had been reported missing by her daughter the week before the murder, but had returned home on her own.

Angelo Campbell Arrested for Kidnapping and Assault on a Female

On Tuesday, November 11, at approximately 8:49 a.m. officers from the Wadesboro Police Department responded to 1404 Old Lilesville Road in response to reports of the kidnapping of a female. When officers arrived they determined that Angelo Campbell had broken into a residence on Myrtlewood Drive in Wadesboro and forcefully taken a woman out of the apartment against her will. The victim's name has not been released.

Through interviews with witnesses officers learned that Campbell had dragged the victim into a wooded area off Anson Apparel Shirt Road prior to their arrival, and was still at large. Through the combined efforts of the Wadesboro Police, the Sheriff's Office K9 Unit and the North Carolina Highway Patrol, they were able to track Campbell's path and locate the victim in the wooded area. She had been struck in the head with an unknown object. Campbell ran on foot through the woods, but was apprehended in that same area a short time later by officers from all the agencies without incident.

The victim was transported to Anson Community Hospital by Anson Rescue Squad where she was treated and released.

Campbell was arrested and charged with Felony Breaking and Entering, Second Degree Kidnapping, Assault with a Deadly Weapon Inflicting Serious Injury with Intent to Kill, Communicating Threats, Habitual Misdemeanor Assault, and three counts of Resisting a Public Officer. Also, warrants held by the Police Department and Sheriff's Office were served on Campbell. He is being held in the Anson County Jail under no bond pending a December 9 court date.

Qualifying factors for enrolling children in the More at Four Pre-K Program include: income that is at or below 75% of the State Median Income level, limited English proficiency, identified disabilities, chronic health conditions, developmental or educational needs, and children of active duty military families.

More at Four classrooms are located at six sites throughout the county. These sites include Anson Children's Center, Ansonville Elementary, Central Center for Children and Families, Faison Center, Morven Elementary, and Open Doors (First United Methodist Church of Wadesboro).

Medicare Part D Enrollment Has Begun

Insurance Commissioner Jim Long wants to remind the state's 1.3 million Medicare beneficiaries that the Medicare Part D open enrollment period started November 15, and will continue through the end of the year.

"Now is the time to make changes to your Medicare Part D plan - whether you want to switch your prescription drug coverage to a plan that better meets your needs or you are enrolling in Part D for the very first time," said Commissioner Jim Long. "If you don't act now during this six-week enrollment period, you'll have to wait another year before you can make changes. Just like other insurance decisions, choosing a Part D plan can be confusing and overwhelming, but my staff in the SHIIP Division can help you make an informed decision."

SHIIP, or the Seniors' Health Insurance Information Program, employs trained staff who can answer questions about Medicare Part D. For the coming year, North Carolina will have 49 prescription drug plans (PDPs) available to Medicare beneficiaries, and 21 companies will administer the plans. Some existing plans also have changed their prescription formularies, monthly premiums and deductibles. [See attached chart for the most current Part D companies and PDPs.]

"There are programs available to those who qualify for extra help paying for their prescription drugs," said Commissioner Long. Low income beneficiaries may qualify for Medicare's prescription drug assistance program or North Carolina's NCRx program. To learn more about extra financial help, contact your local Social Security Administration office or call NCRx at 888-488-6279.
