

NC Navigators are here to help North Carolinians enroll in affordable health insurance

plans on HealthCare.gov during the Affordable Care Act's seventh open-enrollment period, which started November 1 and runs through December 15. Throughout open enrollment, North Carolina consumers can call 1-855-733-3711 (toll-free) or visit ncnavigator.net to schedule a free, confidential, in-person appointment

with a certified NC Navigator in their area. Consumers can also meet with navigators by attending any of the 80 free enrollment events to be held across the state during open enrollment. All enrollment events are free and open to the public. No registration is required. Check out the events calendar on ncnavigator.net for the complete list.

NC navigators are trained to help consumers enroll in coverage on the Health Insurance Marketplace at *HealthCare.gov*, the online storefront that consumers can visit to browse and enroll in affordable, comprehensive health insurance plans. NC navigators can help consumers understand the details of the plans available on

HealthCare.gov, complete the enrollment process and determine their eligibility for financial assistance. Last year, nine in 10 North Carolinians who enrolled in coverage on HealthCare.gov received financial assistance. "We want consumers to know that financial assistance is still available," Mark Van

Arnam, director of the Consortium, said. "Most North Carolinians who are enrolled in a HealthCare.gov plan get financial help that lowers the monthly cost of their coverage to less than \$70. Navigators can help consumers determine if they are eligible for financial assistance and, if they are, help them sign up to get it." North Carolinians who are already enrolled in a HealthCare.gov plan will automatically get re-enrolled in 2019 coverage, but navigators are urging consumers to check back in

to see if a more suitable plan is available. The average cost of premiums has decreased to \$68 a month, so consumers might be able to find a plan that offers equivalent or better coverage for cheaper. **Being Storm Ready**

Anson County is a Storm Ready county

More North Carolina counties have been designated as StormReady by the National Weather Service (NWS), as part of the Service's program to help communities

across America mitigate the effects from natural disasters. Twelve more counties joined 74 counties and nine communities in North Carolina already recognized as being StormReady. This year's additional StormReady counties are Halifax, Macon, Gaston, Graham, Haywood, Jackson, Montgomery, Northampton, Perquimans, Rowan, Sampson and Watauga. According to the NWS, 98% of all presidentially declared disasters are weather-related, leading to around 500 deaths per year and nearly \$15 billion in damage. Since 2016,

four large storms in North Carolina have caused major flooding, loss of life and cost billions of dollars. Many people are still recovering from the effects of Hurricane Matthew in 2016 as well as Florence and Tropical Storm Michael in 2018. Recently, Hurricane Dorian inundated Ocracoke and damaged other areas along the North Carolina coast. The state has also experienced several rounds of severe weather including winter storms, tornadoes and tropical storms. It's important that communities become more resilient through preparations that reduce their vulnerability from extreme weather and water events. North Carolina Emergency

Management helps to accomplish this by working with community leaders and emergency managers to improve the planning, education and awareness needed to mitigate problem areas while developing the communication and safety skills needed to save lives and property.

The StormReady program uses a grassroots approach to encourage counties and communities to proactively improve local hazardous weather operations by: Establishing a 24-hour warning point and emergency operations center

- Offering the public more than one way to receive severe weather warnings, alerts and forecasts Creating a system that monitors weather conditions locally
- Promoting the importance of public readiness through community seminars
- Developing a formal hazardous weather plan, which includes training severe weather

spotters and holding emergency exercises. In addition to the program's designated communities, StormReady recognizes as
