Families Urged to Practice Safety on Thanksgiving

Parents should keep their eye on the stovetop and children out of the kitchen

Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal Wayne Goodwin reminds families that safety in the kitchen is always important, but it is especially so on Thanksgiving Day when there is a lot of activity and people at the home. According to the National Fire Protection Association, Thanksgiving is the leading day of the year for home fires involving cooking equipment.

With so much going on, I want to make sure that families take precautions to make the holiday a happy one," said Goodwin. "One way to do that is to keep some safety tips in mind while preparing that big Thanksgiving meal.'

- Goodwin recommends the following safety measures: Stay in the kitchen when you are cooking on the stovetop
- so you can keep an eye on the food.
- Stay at home when cooking your turkey, check on it frequently. • Keep children away from the stove. The stove will be hot
- and kids should stay three feet away.
- Keep kids stay away from hot food and liquids. The steam or splash from vegetables, gravy or coffee could cause serious burns. • Organize activities that keep kids out of the kitchen during this busy time.
- · Keep the floor clear so you don't trip over kids, toys, pocketbooks or bags
- Keep knives out of the reach of children.
- Be sure electric cords from an electric knife, coffee maker, plate warmer or mixer are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of a child.
- Keep matches and utility lighters out of the reach of children (up high in a locked cabinet).
- Never leave children alone in room with a lit candle.
- Make sure your smoke alarms are working. Test them by pushing the test button.

In addition, the North Carolina Office of State Fire Marshal strongly discourages the use of outdoor gas-fueled turkey fryers that immerse the turkey in hot oil. These turkey fryers use a substantial quantity of cooking oil at high temperatures, and units currently available for home use pose a significant danger that hot oil will be released at some point during the cooking process. The use of turkey fryers by consumers can lead to devastating burns, other injuries and the destruction of property.

the larger crowds and the extended store hours. These factors and the usual distraction of shopping, creates a more favorable environment for thieves and other offenders."

The Sheriff reminds all Anson County residents to follow these shopping safety tips:

• A single shopper is the best target for theft. Always shop with a friend or relative.

• When going shopping, tell someone where you are going and what time to expect you to return. Also, make sure they know what you are wearing, as well as the type of vehicle you are driving

• Shop during daylight hours. If you shop at night, park your vehicle in a well-lit area.

· Dress casually and comfortably and avoid wearing expensive jewelry. If carrying cash, keep it in a pocket rather than in a purse or wallet. This makes it much more difficult for a pickpocket to remove. Also store car keys in a pants or jacket pocket. If your purse is stolen, you will still be able to drive home.

Pay careful attention to your surroundings and avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.

• When returning to your vehicle, check around it and in the back seat. Be aware of strangers approaching you for any reason. Have you car keys in your hand to avoid spending unnecessary time unprotected from the security of your vehicle.

• If you feel uneasy returning to your vehicle alone, find a security guard and ask them to walk you to your car.

 Store purchased items in a trunk or back storage area of SUVs where they cannot be seen.

Sheriff Allen warns shoppers to be careful so that they don't become the victim of criminal activity. "Unfortunately, when shopping, people have a tendency to let their guard down.
